Military Records

- Many available in online-databases, but not all have been indexed.
- National Archives, Washington, D.C. https://www.archives.gov/research Pension files may require an onsite visit. [16,17]

Land Records

- LDS library https://www.familysearch.org/search/collection/2078654. Some of the grantor/grantee records have been indexed. Digital images of some records are available, but not indexed. [20, 47]

Church Records

Many transcriptions are available in print and online. More digital copies of originals are appearing online; often it's more effective to search the original church records by date than use name searches.
