New York City, formerly New Amsterdam

Under the Dutch, the City of New Amsterdam received its charter in 1653, growing up Manhattan Island over time.

Manhattan Island and some surrounding island make up New York City as it grows, until New York City annexes land from Westchester County in 1874 and again in 1895. In 1898 Modern New York City is formed. New York's counties also hold records in addition to the City.

Key Records in New York State and New York Coity

Consider how record were created. Under what law, regulation, or requirement would they have been written down. What agency or organization was the creator. Does that same entity still hold the records, or have they been published.

Civil Vital Records

New York State and New York City have separate civil vital records.

Look for government-generated (official) records by checking the years of coverage in the indexes and databases. Many of those are available online (but were not in past years). See the NYG&B subject guide for links: nygbs.org/new-york-birth-marriage-death-vital-records

The main coverage for **New York State** starts in 1880/1881. Indexes can be found online. Original records may be requested from the New York State Department of Health or from the local municipality.

- Deaths 1880-present
- Births 1881-present
- Marriages 1881-present

New York City's records begin earlier than the state records. Indexes can be found online for publicly available records from the New York City Municipal Archives. Other indexes contain records that are held at the New York City Clerk's Marriage Bureau or at the New York City Department of Health and Mental Hygiene.

- Deaths 1795-present
- Births 1847-present (gaps)
- Marriages 1829-present (more starting in the 1870s)

Federal and State Census Records

Federal census coverage is the same for the state and city, except a small portion of 1890 survives (parts of the town of Brookhaven (Suffolk County) and the town of Eastchester (Westchester County) and the 1870 federal census.

1870 federal census: New York City was granted a second enumeration, taken in late 1870 and early 1871. It is most easily distinguished on Ancestry.com.

The 1890 Police Census index on FamilySearch is preferred for the greater coverage and found at https://www.familysearch.org/search/collection/2381996. The surviving 894 of 1008 books (88%) are included. Ancestry.com's index is only a portion of the surviving records. Microfilm is available at the NYPL, and through FamilySearch Affiliate libraries to view the digitized microfilm.
