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Introduction

I have been designated our family genealogist. After taking over my brother, Peter Engeldrum's, search of our Swedish family, (Peterson and Ordell), and reading his research on my father's paternal connections (Engeldrum), I decided to embark on a search for my father's maternal connection, the Meyers. I began with very little information. I only knew "Aunt Ella" Lindberg and my father's cousins, Joseph and William Meyer. The most interesting piece of information was a group picture my father had, of a Meyer Anniversary celebration, dated December 22, 1934, in honor of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Meyer. The only familiar faces were my Mom, Edna Peterson and my Dad, George Engeldrum, Aunt Ella Meyer Lindberg her husband Henry Lindberg and my grandfather, George P. Engeldrum, whom we just recently identified. This was the starting point. Through my research, many people in that picture have now been identified.

This family history book reflects the research I have completed to date. The research included assistance from a researcher in Germany, writing for documents, reviewing German church records, internet searching and writing letters of inquiry. Several of those letters resulted in uncovering leaves on the family tree: Carol Rogers Baum, Great Granddaughter of Gerhard Frederick Meyer; Judith Lockhart Walsh, Great Great Granddaughter of Herman Meyer; Clayton Heimberg, Great Grandson of Johanna Meyer Heimberg; Anna Eagen Meyer, widow of Charles Meyer, Grandson of John Meyer and Lauren Meyer Roach, Great Granddaughter of Gerhard Frederick Meyer. I am the Great Granddaughter of Bernhard Heinrick Meyer. I have located descendants of all the siblings of Johan Dietrick Meyer and Johanna Kortlücke Meyer except for the oldest son, Heinrich Wilhelm.

This is a family history of our immigrant ancestors, Johan Dietrick Meyer and Johanna Kortlücke Meyer. The perennial question was where to start the story. It seemed natural to start the family saga with the brave ancestors who packed up a few belongings to start a new life in the United States of America.

Chapter One -The Old World: Prussia

Prussia

Preußen was a historic state originating out of the Duchy of Prussia and the Margraviate of Brandenburg. For centuries this state had substantial influence on German and European history. The last capital of the state of Prussia was Berlin. Prussia began as a territory, in what was later called East Prussia. The region was originally populated by Baltic Old Prussians, who were Christian converts and it became a preferred location for immigration by mainly Protestant Germans, Poles, Lithuanians. Before its abolition, the territory of the Kingdom of Prussia included the present day Rhineland and Westphalia.

Prussia attained its greatest importance in the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries. On 18 January 1701, Frederick William's son, Elector Frederick III, upgraded Prussia from a duchy to a kingdom and crowned himself King Frederick I. During the eighteenth century, it became a great European power under the reign of The Great Frederick (1740–86). During the nineteenth century, Chancellor Otto von Bismark pursued a policy of uniting the German principalities into a “lesser germany” which would exclude the Austrian Empire.

After the defeat of the Prussian Army in 1807, the Westphalian territories became part of the Kingdom of Prussia through 1813. It was founded by Napoleon as a French vassal state. In 1815, the kingdom of Prussia received a large amount of territory in the Westphalian region and created the Province of Westphalia. The Province of Westphalia was a province of the Kingdom of Prussia and the Free State of Prussia from 1815 through 1946 (figure A). The present state of North Rhine-Westphalia was created after World War II (1). It is important to understand this changing landscape as we research and trace the location and journey of our ancestors. Records may be in what is now Germany or... France.

The Kingdom of Prussia dominated northern Germany politically, economically, and in population. In 1871, Prussia's population numbered 24.69 million, accounting for sixty percent of the German Empire's population. Following World War I, Prussia became part of the Weimar Republic as a free state in 1919. It effectively lost this status in 1932. Prussia as a state, was abolished, de facto, by the Nazis in 1934 and by the Allies of World War II in 1947 (1).

Westphalia

Westphalia (figure1), the region in Germany located in the state of North Rhine-Westphalia, includes the cities of Cologne, Dortmund Gelsenkirchen and Münster. The capital city is Düsseldorf. Westphalia is roughly the region between the Rhine and Weser Rivers and it's boundaries have changed many times (figure1). Their language, Westphalian, is one of the major dialect groups of West Low German also known as Plattdeutsch. Westphalia is known for the 1648 Peace of Westphalia, the peace treaties of Osnabrück and Münster which was signed in 1648. These treaties ended The Thirty Years' War in Holy Roman Empire and the Eighty Years War between Spain and the Republic of the Seven United Netherlands. The idea of nation-state sovereignty resulting from the

Treaty, became known as “Westphalian sovereignty”. The treaty also provided for the right of Calvinists and Anabaptists to practice their faith in public. The Peace of Westphalia granted Sweden territories as war reparations. Sweden received a war indemnity as well as control of territories including Western Pomerania (henceforth Swedish Pomerania) and was given three voices in the German Reichstag. Sweden became the third largest country in Europe by land area, then, only surpassed by Russia and Spain (2). (This is my Swedish heritage sneaking in here).

As a result of the Protestant Reformation, there is no dominant religion in Westphalia. Roman Catholicism and Lutheranism coexist, Lutheranism being strong in the eastern and northern areas. Our Meyer ancestors were of the Evangelical Lutheran faith.

Westerkappeln

Westerkappeln, (figures 1, 2) is a municipality in the district of Steinfurt in the North Rhine-Westphalia, area of Germany. It is situated among rolling hills, approximately fifteen kilometers northwest of Osnabrück on the northern edge of Tecklenburger country (1). By 1707, Westerkappeln was considered part of Prussia. Around 1723, the village of Cappeln, was included in the city proper. Unfortunately, the exact date of the foundation of the city is not clear (3). The name, Westerkappeln, goes back to the formation of a chapel (capellun) or church west of the church in the diocese of Osnabrück. This was to distinguish it from the chapel in the east (Osterkappeln). Osnabrück developed as a marketplace next to the bishop's principal church. The first Evangelical Church was founded by Charlemagne about 800 BC. Until 1939, the official spelling of “Westerkappeln” remained (4).

In 1939, Westerkappeln and Westerkappeln City merged. With the merger, the old city lost many of its individual rights and has since struggled to recover. In 1975, it was again merged into the county of Steinfurt. The population in 1998 was 11,000 and 11,370 as of December 31, 2007 (4). Westerkappeln has a business and industrial area located on the outskirts of the town, near the City University of Osnabrück and it has slowly been building a healthy economy (6). A very controversial “Brunnenhase” situated in the center of town, was commissioned by the local officials (figure 3). The designer, Henry Brummack, created a well with a rabbit and flowers. It was met with much skepticism by the local towns folk but now is a well established meeting place (5).

The Church

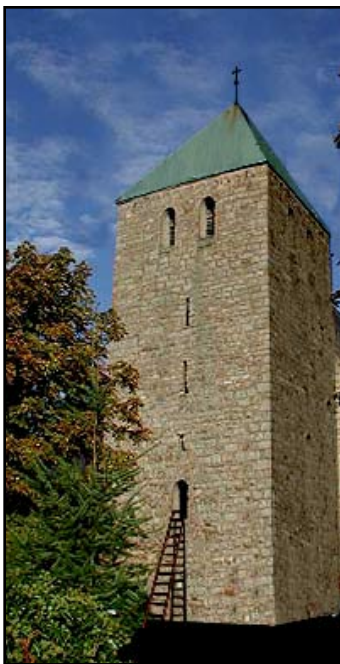


Figure 4. Church Tower.NET

Timber construction was common in the ninth century so it is very likely that the first Westercappeln chapel was a wooden church (2). The tower is noted to be the oldest part of town (5) and the oldest part of the church, dating to the twelfth century. The first mention of the parish of Westercappeln is in the deed books of the Bishop of Onsbruck in 1188 (4). Later, a bell tower was built independent of the church (figure 4). It had only one entrance which was a single opening two and one-half meters above the present door. It was very probable that the tower was used as a refuge during the middle and late middle ages. After climbing to the tower, the ladder was pulled up providing safety from the approaching enemy (4,5). As new portions of the church were added, the church's architectural style transitioned from the Romanesque to the present Gothic structure. Over time, the original frescos (paintings) were preserved. The church also received a new organ in 1821 (2). The church itself is a symbol of over 1000 years of local Christianity. The evangelical church in the center of Westerkappeln, is one of the most prominent church buildings in Tecklenburger country. It is built on a hill overlooking the town of Westerkappeln and has always been the center of the community (5) It is the church where our Meyer and Kartlücke ancestors were baptized, married, and are buried (figure 5).

Castle Cappeln

On the northwestern outskirts of Westerkappeln is the former manor house Cappeln (2). Castle Cappeln was built in the twelfth century, as a moated castle. It was formerly a family home for aristocrats and the seat of the Knights and Counts of Cappeln. In 1382, the castle was destroyed but rebuilt in a Renaissance style. The writer Heinrich Beryhaus writes in his book in 1812, "Pilgrimage Through Life" *House Cappeln in Westercappeln was one of the largest, if not the largest of the aristocratic landowners in the county of Tecklenburg*. The Manor today is privately owned. The House is surrounded by a large park, Cappeln, that includes vegetable gardens, a garden island and a number of avenues (figure 6)(5).

The Great Fire

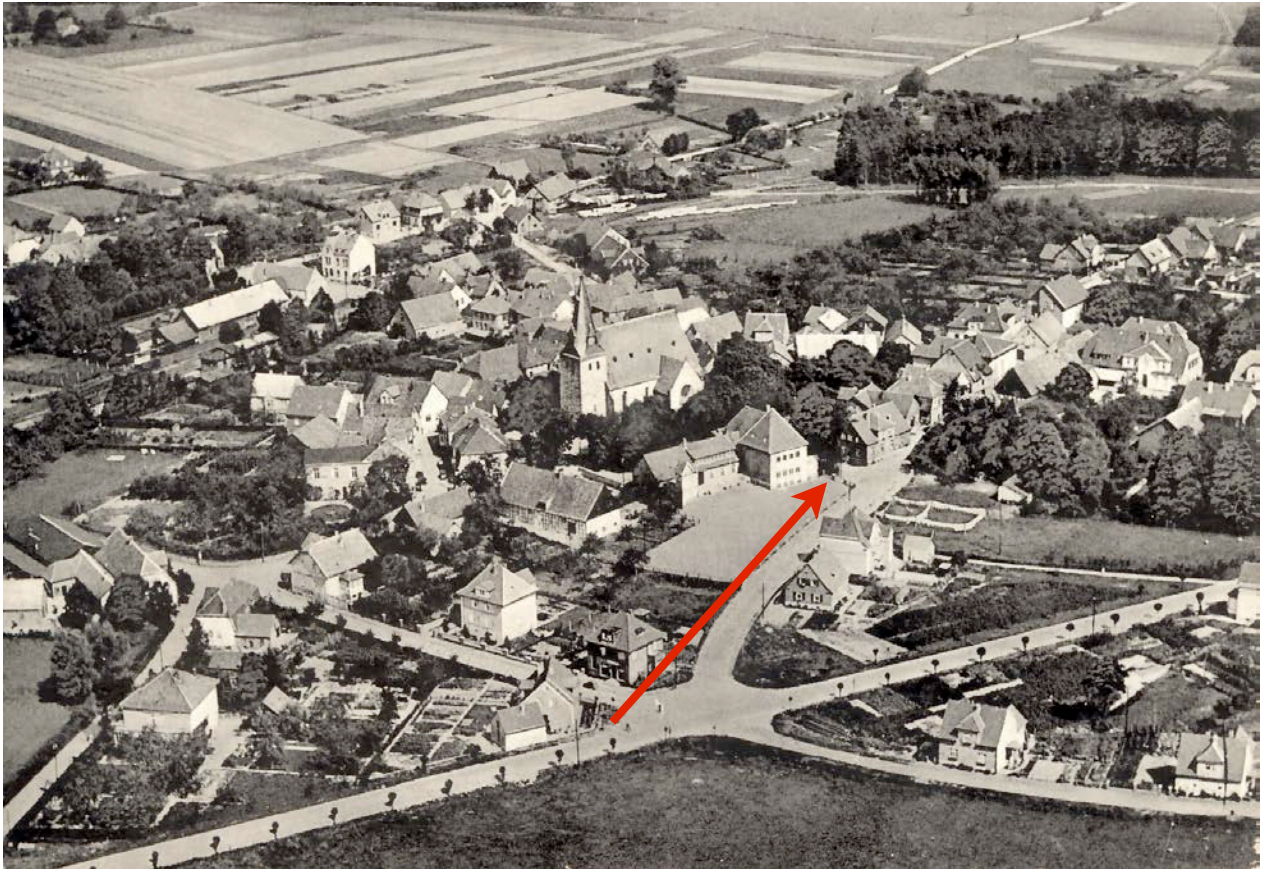


Figure 8A. Aerial photograph of location of Meyer home at Cappeln 16., Westerkappeln (arrow).

The Great fire of 1779, destroyed nearly eighty-five percent of the houses in Westerkappeln (26). According to our distant relative (fourth cousin to the writer's generation), Elke Kartlücke Iborg, the Kartlücke home was destroyed but the family rebuilt it later. The small cottage which housed the workshop, and the barn, were spared and still remain in good condition. The family built a new house in front of the small workshop where the men in the family worked. All the men in the Kartlücke family were coppersmiths. In 2003, Heinz Eduard Kartlücke and his second wife, sold the Kartlücke house. This is the house as it looks today (figures 7,8).

Chapter Two-The New World

Emigration

In northern Germany, the land was passed down, intact, to the first son. If the other sons married, they generally had to rent a farm from a landowner, possibly even their own brother. In this part of Europe, farmers lived in “housebarns,” which were large buildings shared by the farm family and their animals as well as serving as a storage facility for the crops. People and animals used the same entrance. Although this situation seems terribly primitive today, it was typical until the twentieth century.

Toward the end of the eighteenth century, immigration from Germany had tapered off and most of the German states had laws against it. In the early nineteenth century, Westerkappeln and the Principality of Tecklenburg, to which it belonged, became part of Prussia under King Frederick William III. The Napoleonic wars ended the prosperous times, and in 1818, a massive crop failure occurred. In addition, the industrial revolution had a special impact on the area around Westerkappeln. The typical farmer was either a tenant farmer (huermann), or small landowner (brinckliggere or brinkman). In either case, the amount of land was insufficient to support a family by farming alone, and a secondary source of income was required. In most cases it was the manufacture of linen from flax. This cottage industry was displaced by much more efficient factories during the first half of the nineteenth century. The resulting hard times caused massive immigration from certain parts of Germany. Prussians had to apply for and receive official permission to leave their homeland. Records of this process were kept at the local level (figure 11). However, many single men immigrated without permission because they wanted to avoid the required military service. These clandestine immigrations were not recorded (7). Drove of disillusioned Germans turned their sights abroad when the Revolution of 1848 failed to produce desired reforms within the German confederation.

All these factors contributed to the massive emigration movement which began about 1832. When reports and rumors of the promised land reached the people, potential emigrants were willing to listen to the shipping agents and semi-governmental representatives who encouraged them to leave (32). This was very significant for Westerkappeln. Between the years 1832 and 1890, a recorded number of 2,422 people were listed by name, who emigrated to North America. Among them are our Meyer and Kortluke ancestors (5).

During this time, land in the United States was cheap, fertile, and plentiful, making it an ideal choice for immigrants eager to establish new settlements and to begin new lives. Maps (figure 10), helped show them the way to North America (8). German communities in the United States became so prevalent that on the eve of World War I, some six percent of American children spoke only German in primary school. War with Germany hastened the decline in the use of German in the United States. Nonetheless, in Pennsylvania, official state documents remained available in German until as late as 1950 (8).

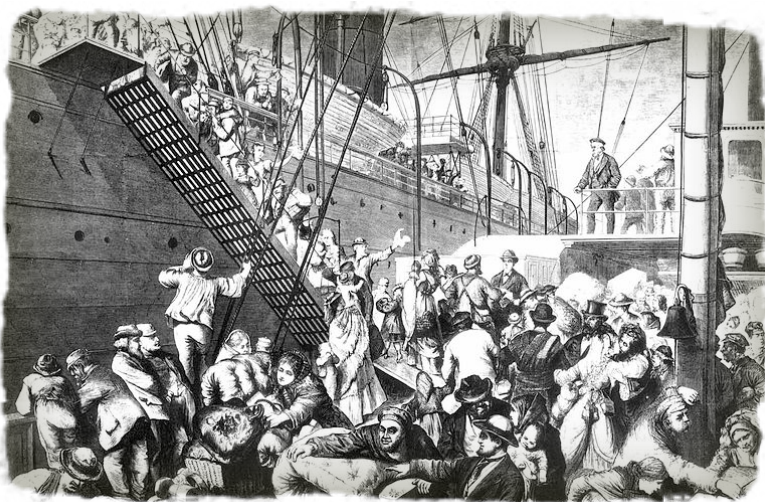


Figure 9. German emigrants boarding a steamer in Hamburg, published in Harper's Weekly, (New York) November 7, 1874. PD published in US before 1923

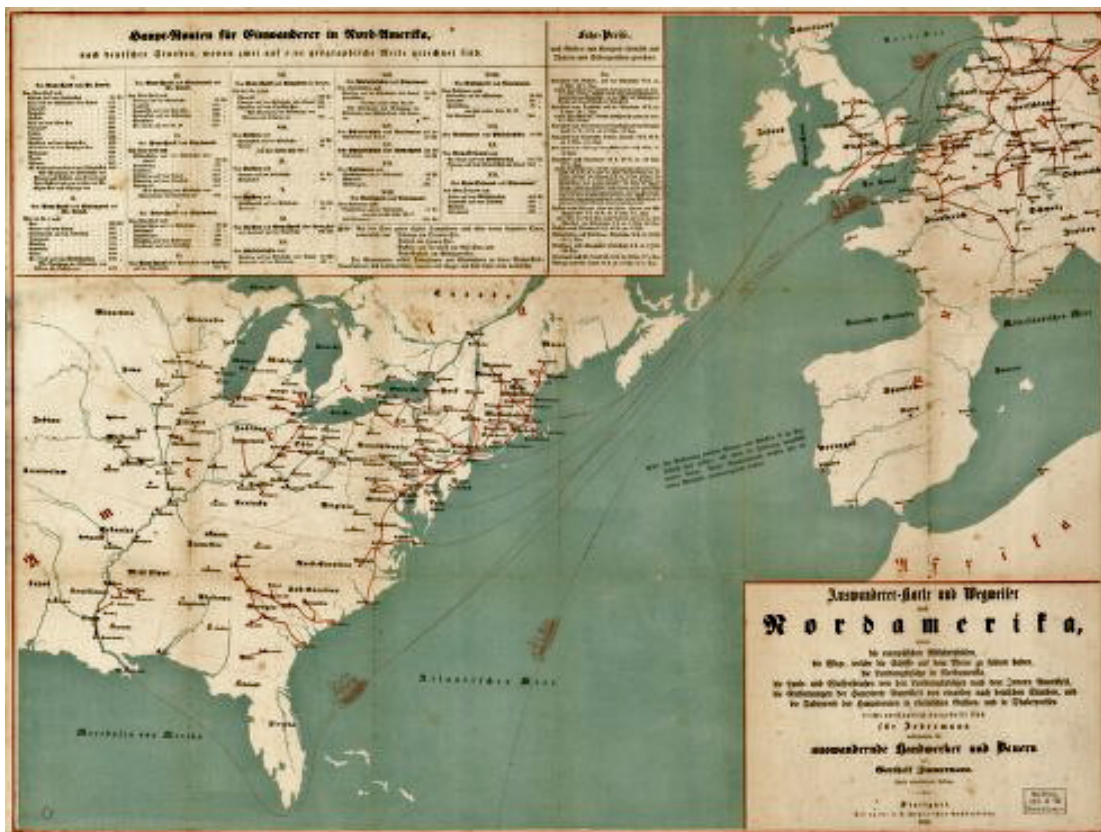


Figure 10. Emigrant's Map and Guide for Routes to North America This map reflects the importance of German immigration to North America in the mid-19th century. When the Revolution of 1848 failed to produce desired reforms within the German confederation, droves of disillusioned Germans turned their sights abroad. Maps such as this helped show them the way.

The Journey

The Meyer family was living at Cappeln 16, Westerkappeln (figure 8A). On 7 March 1862, they received permission to emigrate (29) and so began their journey to the United States. They left their home village of Westerkappeln on Monday, 14 April 1862 (figure 11) and arrived in New York on Monday, 9 June 1862, a journey of sixty days! They left the Port of Bremen aboard the ship, *Elise Mathilde*, a ship with three masts with square sails on each. Before 1865, cargo ships were temporarily adapted for passengers. A deck was built between the upper deck and the hold, providing space for passengers (between the decks) (11). This ship, with 263 passengers, also carried merchandise for sale in America. The *Elise Mathilde* was cleared for arrival on Friday, 7 June 1862 (30). The ship may have arrived at the dock in Hoboken, New Jersey. It was noted in a *New York Times* article, September 6, 1872, that the *Ship Frisis* arrived at the Hamburg Dock in Hoboken after an eleven day passage from Hamburg in continuously rough weather. Ellis Island did not open until 1892, some years after the arrival of our ancestors. Traveling with the Meyers was Wilhelm Kartlücke, age sixteen, a nephew of Johanna Kartlücke Meyer. As noted on the passenger manifest, Johan Diedrick Meier, Johanna Frederike Kartlücke Meier, traveled with their five children, and his mother, Catharine Meier, a widow. They were all listed as MEIER on the passenger manifest (figure 11A). The children all traveled between decks, while their parents and grandmother traveled in the second cabin. The family probably did not have enough money for the children to travel in the second cabin. Imagine traveling with six children ages eight to seventeen, and imagine packing for this journey! They needed to carry essentials such as personal items, underclothes, gloves, hat, stockings, baptismals, prayer book, hand towels. They also needed to pack some belongings in a trunk: linen, lamp, ink in a bottle, kitchen utensils, and clothes. Many also brought seeds for planting when they arrived. Many of the items brought by many immigrants are on display at Ellis Island. Steerage conditions were primitive. Mattresses and bedding had to be provided by the passengers. There were few latrines and limited ventilation. The steerage area was a bedroom, dining room all in one. Meals included salt meat, pea soup, potatoes, rice, prunes, herring, and sauerkraut (figure 9)(11).

Adapting to a New Land

After this tedious sixty day journey, the Meyers arrived to a new country which was engaged in a Civil War. In the eastern part of the country, huge battles like the confrontation between the ironclad warships, the Merrimac and the Monitor, Battles of Yorktown and Shiloh, and the capture of New Orleans, Louisiana, were the talk of the countryside. In the west, the news was about the expansion into the western states, and the new Morrill Land Grant College Act to support the financing of agricultural and mechanical education, and to assure that education would be available to those in all social classes, were the talk (31).

Sentiment among German Americans was largely antislavery, and most German immigrants, like many other immigrants, settled in the pro-Union free states of the North and northwest and joined the Union Army in large numbers. Over 6,000 Germans in New York immediately responded to President Lincoln's call for volunteers. They were the children and elders who had battled for their freedom in 1848 in their own land (27). The Germans were the largest immigrant group to participate in the Civil War; over 176,000 Union soldiers were born in Germany. Roughly one in every three German born males, offered his life for his adopted country. This patriotic participation of German Americans helped ease their acceptance into mainstream culture (32).

In September 1862, The Emancipation Proclamation precipitated many riots. Immigrants were concerned about the free slaves taking all the jobs. There were riots against blacks all over the North (22). The Conscription Act, passed soon after The Emancipation Proclamation, provided for freedom of all slaves in states, or parts of states, still in rebellion against the Union on January 1, 1863. It also permitted admitting African-Americans, north and south into the Union military forces. In New York City, where racial feelings among Irish immigrants were embittered by fears of black competition, a serious riot, spanning three days, erupted on July 13, 1863 (23). The protesters, on the first day, included German, Irish, and native industrial workers and artisans. The workers were angered by wartime job shortages and low wages, and fearful of African-American job competition. They saw both acts, The Emancipation Proclamation and the Conscription Act, as an attempt to uplift African Americans at their expense (21).

In the business and commercial arena *“The effects of the war have been visible on every side, and in every business. New York, the great financial centre of the Union has been sensitive to every victory and defeat. Not only has the City sent it's thousands upon thousands to the seat of war but it has furnished a great portion of the money necessary to maintain the army and the navy and to render both efficient. Our city is the commercial as well as the financial centre of the Union. necessary in addition to passing loan bills....alter the tariff laws. It seems almost incredible that our people should have purchased so extensively abroad when our county was in such peculiar condition.....The years 1861 and 1862 were both blessed with a bountiful harvest. Our grain yield was immense....(24)”*

It is against this backdrop of history that our ancestors made a new life for themselves and their children.

New Home

Driven by regional turmoil, industrialization, and the dawn of the global economy, over thirty-million immigrants poured into America between 1815 and 1914. Until the early 1890s, the bulk of America's new residents came from northern and western Europe, as scores of Irish and German citizens fled, from the ravages of the Irish famine and the failed revolutions that engulfed Central Germany. Migrants decided to cross the Atlantic to America in search for a better way of life, or, at the very least, some form of work (12).

Our first documentation of Johanna and Johan Meyer found them in Hoboken, New Jersey for a very short time. Exact dates are not known, but son, John Dietrick, was born in Hoboken, New Jersey, in 1863, according to his birth record, and daughter, Wilhelmine C.F. Meyer, was born in New York City in 1864. The family was living in Jersey City, New Jersey in 1870. It appears that Johan Dietrick died soon thereafter and Johanna Meyer settled in Manhattan, New York, on the Lower East Side, where we found documentation of the family living at 16 Sullivan Street, New York. No death record has been found for Johan Meyer. Originally, the "Lower East Side" referred to the area alongside the East River from about Canal Street and the Manhattan Bridge, up to Fourteenth Street and roughly bounded on the west by Broadway. It included areas known today as The East Village, Alphabet City, Chinatown, Bowery, and Little Italy. New York's Lower East Side, is the first neighborhood through which the hundreds of thousands of immigrants, from southern and eastern Europe, streamed into at the end of the nineteenth and beginning of the twentieth centuries. It was possibly the most congested district in the world and was also one of the oldest and most densely populated working-class and immigrant settlement districts in Manhattan. Along with Italians, Poles, Ukrainians, and other ethnic groups, it once had a sizable German population, and was known as Little Germany, Kleindeutschland (13).

Little Germany, was the densely populated German neighborhood, in the Lower East side, around Thompkins Square Park, (which today is bounded by Avenue A and Avenue B, and Seventh and Tenth Streets). In the 1850s alone, 800,000 Germans passed through New York City. The German immigrants differed from some of the other ethnic groups, as they usually were educated and had marketable skills in crafts. More than half of the bakers and cabinet makers were Germans or of German origin, and many Germans also worked in the construction business. Educated Germans were important players in the creation of trade unions and were also often politically active. At the beginning of the twentieth century, Little Germany had a population of almost 50,000 people. The neighborhood was the cultural center of German activities in New York, with beer gardens, sport clubs, libraries, choirs, shooting clubs, German schools, and churches (14)(figure 14). After arriving in America, our Meyer family members worked as grocers, butchers, bottlers and machinists. Along with other immigrants families, on New York's Lower East Side, our Meyers lived in tiny, windowless rooms in crowded tenement districts on Sullivan Street, Bleeker Street, Hudson Street, and Ninth Avenue. The Streets where our ancestors lived are highlighted in yellow (figure 12).

The streets were lined with rows and rows of three-story buildings, with shops below and tenement quarters above. The buildings were usually of brick with perhaps stone or terra-cotta trimmings, with many iron fire-escapes that descended in flights to the street. These teeny, dark apartments usually housed an average family of six or eight people and if the family was really strapped, the six or eight family members would live and sleep in the two front rooms, with a paying lodger getting the privacy of the back bedroom. The fire-escapes were often littered with clothing, boxes, or cans; the steps and areaways were worn smooth with the shuffle of many feet. The streets had rows and rows of pushcarts. Occasionally there was an alley or small court that ran in back or across the rear of the buildings, where children played, and women sat. These were the tenements, where people gathered by the scores; men, women, and children, where they worked, ate and slept. During the day, while the children were at school, (or often working), the same apartments would be used as sweat shops where up to twelve people would cram into the two front rooms to make clothes. On almost every floor was a common hallway where people washed. Very little was private (figure 13). *“All the tenements here were of this size and shape—a room with windows opening upon the court and at the rear the small black bin or pen for the bed.The room was perhaps twelve feet square and the bin was six, and for such a dwelling the tenant pays six dollars a month. There was always the one room, where the inmates lived by day, and the one den, where they slept by night, apparently all in the same bed, though probably the children were strewn about the floor. If the tenement were high up the living-room had more light and air than if it were low down; but the sleeping hole never had any light or air of its own. I do not think it is well for human beings to live whole families together in one room with a kennel out of it, where modesty may survive, but decency is impossible.”* These are ramblings from author William Dean Howells’ related observations of his tour of the east side tenement (25).

Death and Disease

Copies of United States census records showed us that multiple Meyer family members lived together in the tenement and often there was also a boarder at the same address, presumably to provide additional income for the family. Disease and death was common in such places. Tuberculosis was prevalent. Other diseases such as pneumonia, and intestinal disorders were the result of insufficient food, bad sanitation, foul air, crowded, small, ill-ventilated rooms, drafts in the winter, the heat of summer, with the buzz of flies in the air (20, 21). As you will see in the following chapters, our Meyer family was not immune to the ills of the tenement environment. We know Johanna and Herman had six children and only two survived. Gerhard and Anna had six, five survived, Bernhard and Caroline had five, four survived, Johanna and Adolf had five, four survived. John and Ella had six, two survived and it is possible Wilhelmine died in childbirth. Many of the children who survived their childhood, did not live into their thirties. Weather also provided challenges to survival. Our Meyers survived the 5.2-5.5 magnitude earthquake of 1884, that toppled steeples and pulled houses off foundations and the blizzard of March 12, 1888, a calamitous event. Even snowplows were a sorry remedy for the mountains of snow. They also survived the heat wave of the summer of August 1896, with temperature averaging 90.7 degrees for nine days.

Marriages

Most of Meyers married in the St. John's German Lutheran Church on Christopher Street, in the Lower East Side (figure.15). St. Johns was built in the Federal-style in 1821-1822 for the Eighth Presbyterian Church. In 1842, the property was sold to St. Matthew's Episcopal Church congregation, who worshiped there until 1855, when it was turned over to the German Lutherans. Victorian features were added in 1886 by Berg & Clark, and the pediment was inscribed, "Deutsche Evangelish-Lutherische St. Johannes Kirche." St. John's is now located within the Greenwich Village Historic District of the New York City Landmarks Preservation Commission. St. John's is one of the oldest religious buildings in Greenwich Village (19).

Final Rest

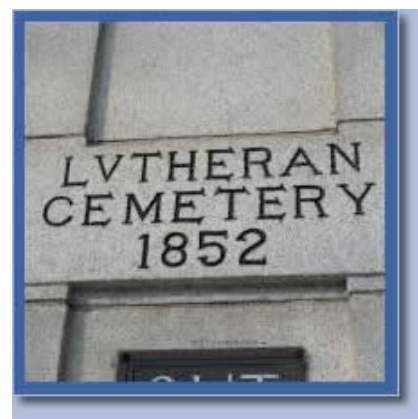


Figure 16. The All Faiths Cemetery, Middle Village, Queens, New York

Most of the Meyers are buried in the All Faith's Lutheran Cemetery in Middle Village Queens, New York. (figure 16). Lutheran Cemetery was founded in Middle Village in 1852 by German churches located in Kleindeutschland (16). In 1852, The Reverend Frederick William Geissenhainer, pastor of St. Paul's German Lutheran Church in Manhattan, bought 225 acres in Middle Village for a cemetery to serve Lower East Side immigrants. Members decided to call it the Lutheran Cemetery although it was open to all faiths. Today, it is the All Faiths Cemetery (18). The price of burials in this cemetery was originally \$2.50, and lots were sold at \$7.00 (15)(figure 16).

Disaster struck Little Germany on June 15, 1904. St Mark's Evangelical Lutheran Church had organized their seventeenth annual picnic to commemorate the end of the school year. Shortly after departing, a fire started in a storage compartment in the forward section of their boat. Approximately 1,021 passengers on The *General Slocum*, died by fire or drowning. The disaster was a key factor in hastening the end of the Lower East Side German community, accelerating an exodus from Little Germany that was already well underway (14). The All Faith's Lutheran Cemetery became the final resting place for the 1,021 victims of the excursion boat. Many of the remaining German settlers in New York moved to Yorkville, a neighborhood with the East River, 79th to 96th Streets as the boundaries. East 86th Street was sometimes called the "German Broadway"(17).

By the early 1900's we found the Meyer family also scattered throughout New York City, from The Bronx, to 122nd Street in uptown Manhattan, to Brooklyn.

Chapter Three-Meyer Genealogy

Meyer-Its' Genesis

One reason why the Meyer surname is so common, is that it has an occupational origination in the fifth century and comes from the Gallo-Roman term "major", meaning "someone in a higher position". The term "major" evolved into "Meior" in Old High German, then "Meier" in Middle High German, meaning "higher or superior". It was often used for stewards of landholders, great farmers or leaseholders. Today a Meier is a dairy farmer. Meier and Meyer are used more often in Northern Germany, while Maier and Mayer are found more frequently in Southern Germany (5). The terms low, middle, and high are strictly geographical references and do not refer to social class. Our Meyer ancestors probably spoke *Niederdeutsch* or low German, as they lived in the *Plattdeutsch* in the rural and small towns of northern Germany (34). We must keep in mind all possible spellings of the name when searching for our ancestors.

German given names fall into three categories: "wish" names, such as Bernhard (strong as a bear), Conrad (wise counselor); Christian names like Johan, Margaretha, and kings and saints names like Frederich, and Wilhelm (33). Female names were often long and pronounced slowly; Johanna, Charlotte, Margarete, Wilhelmine. Boys names on the other hand were short and hard sounding; Georg, Karl (34). Often children had two or three given names and may have been referred to by a different name in a variety of official documents. I can attest to that. That presents a big problem when researching, you really have to play connect the dots. If a child died, it was customary to give the same name to the next child in order to preserve the name of the ancestor. The Meyers were no different. I have used the common genealogy numbering system to identify ancestors. Johan Meyer BD 1705 is 1, his son Johan Diederick Meyer is 1.1 (the first son of 1), his son, Johan Diederick Meyer is 1.1.1 and so on. In the following chapter I have presented documentation about the six children of Johan and Johanna Kartlücke Meyer and their children. Thus we have documentaion on seven generations.

I have chosen to limit each family history to our immigrant ancestors, their seven children and the third generation due to the multiple branches and extended families on our family tree. I have taken author's liberties and added a generation to my branch, that of Bernhard Heinrich Meyer. There is, in the last chapter, a listing of all the descendants of our earliest ancestor, Johan Dietrick Meyer (BD 1705) as well as the descendants of the Kartlücke's. For privacy reasons, I have also excluded birth years of living persons. If anyone is interested in a print out of all the vital statistics, please feel free to contact me. I must also explain the various spellings. You will notice that Meyer, Kartlücke and Dietrick have a variety of spellings. You will also notice, abbreviations and the reversal of given name and christening name. This is the way they were given or spelled in the many references I have researched. What is the correct way? I will leave that up to you. All genealogical references sources are listed in the Appendix. The reference source for Genealogical references are indicated by ®1, ®2 and so on. General references are (1), (2) and so on. The use of < or > with dates indicates the year is calculated based on other documentation. The symbol < denotes before and > denotes after the stated year.

On 15 August 1819, twenty-one year old Johan Frederick Meyer married twenty-two year old Anna Catharina Maria Elsabein Stallmann in Evangelische Kirsche, Westerkappeln@22@19. The married couple lived with Anna's parents, the Schürmanns. Johan was apparently renting his living space from his in-laws. He was a heurmann (renter) living in a heurhaus (rented house)@19. This means that he was a tenant farmer. He had rented a very small house, on a small piece of land, on the grounds of the Schürmann farm. As a hired hand, he had to pay some money. Part of the hire-contract, was that he and his family had to work several days per week for the farmer without being paid. For the rest of the week, he possibly worked on the farm or a neighboring farm as a farmhand to make some money. Some of these heuerlings (renters), also had a profession like wooden shoe maker, mason, tailor, etc@24. We know Johan worked as a farmer and a shoemaker, according to the passenger manifest and Anna Catharina was a midwife@2. Johan died at the age of twenty-four, leaving behind his two year old son, Johan Heinrich and Anna, his pregnant wife@25. Anna remarried Gerog Wilhelm Reike in 1836 and she was listed as widow, Catherine Meier, age sixty-five, when she emigrated in 1862@18@29@30@28. Anna was not listed with son Johan and his family in Jersey City, New Jersey in the 1870 Federal census. We can assume that she died shortly after arrival in America, between 1862 and 1870. In September 2007, a search of the New Jersey Death Index for 1848-1867 and 1868-1878 did not reveal any death records.

Church records listed Johan's godparents as Hermann Henrich Stratemeyer, and Catharina Maria Elsabein Stallmann, probably his grandmother³⁴⁵. He also used his name Johan Dietrick interchangeably. On son Gerhard's death certificate, he was listed as Dietrick³². This makes researching very difficult, especially since there are several family members with the same name.

Johanna also used her given names interchangeably. Her middle name was listed as Fridereike, Fransisca, and Charlotte on the children's christening records²⁶²⁷²⁸.

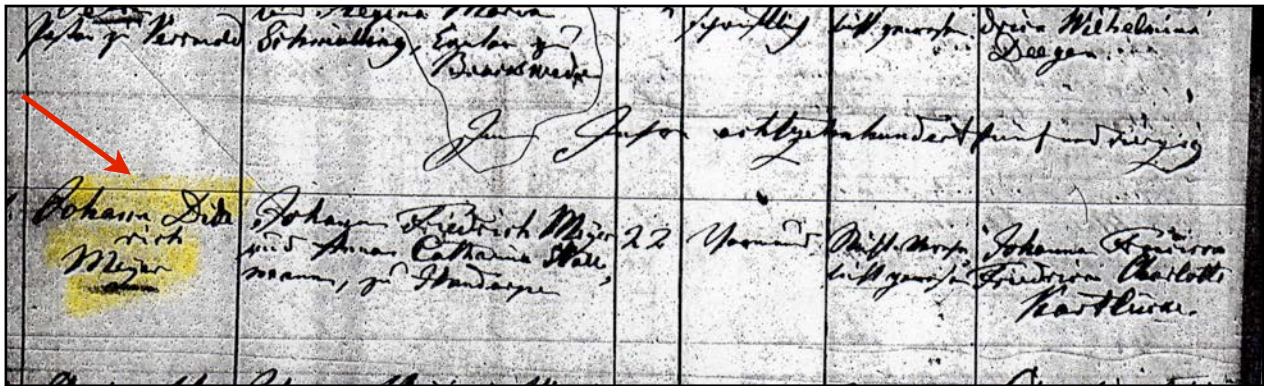
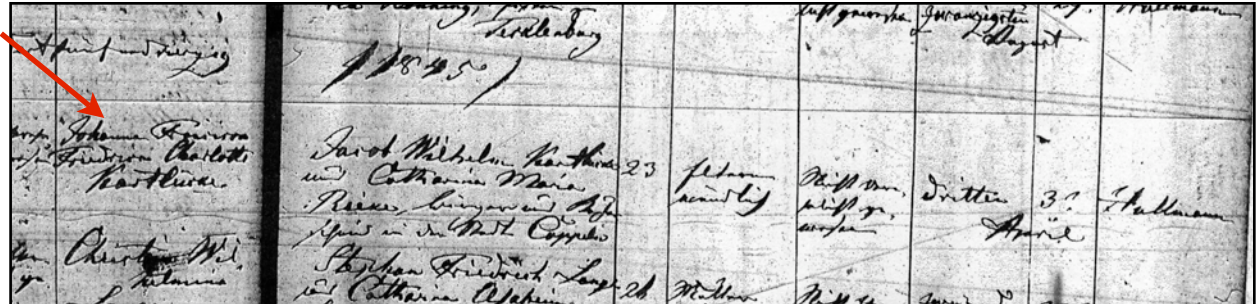
At the time their emigration permit was issued in March 1862, the family was living at Cappeln 16, Westerkappeln⁶⁹(figure 8A). We do know that Johan was working as a shoemaker at the time and that he must have been very close to his mother, as Anna Catherina traveled with Johan and his family to America¹¹(figure 11). Other than the information listed on the manifest (figure 11A), we know very little about Johan. We do know all the family was listed as Meier and as previously noted, the parents and grandmother traveled in the second cabin and the children, including Johanna's nephew, William Kartlucke, traveled between the decks¹¹. Upon arrival in the United States, we can assume the family settled in Hoboken, New Jersey, as it was the birthplace of son John. In 1865, we found Johan and Johanna living at 79 Orchard Street, New York City where daughter Wilhelmine (Minna) was born¹².

In 1870, the family was living in Jersey City, New Jersey, with daughter, Anna (Johanna) and two other children, Dedrick and Minna, born in New York. Johan was working as a liquor dealer. The 1870 census indicates that Johan was a citizen of the United States¹³. However, I question this as his children would also have become citizens at that time as well, but we know that they each applied for citizenship on their own²⁹³⁰³¹. Johan apparently died not long after 1876. He was listed as J.D. Meyer on son Gerhard's marriage record in November 1876¹⁴, but there was a notation on daughter Johanna's marriage record in 1877, which indicated that her father was deceased¹⁵. In 1878, the marriage record of son Herman Wilhelm, also listed his father as deceased¹⁶. We can assume that Johan died some time between November 1876 and July 1877. No death record was found in New Jersey, in a search from January 1,1878 through December 31,1880¹⁸. To further substantiate this, we found his wife Johanna, a widow, living with her oldest son, William, and his family at 16 Sullivan Street, New York City, in 1880¹⁷. By 1900, Johanna had moved to 168 South Second, Brooklyn, Kings, New York, with her daughter Johanna Heimberg, son-in-law Adolf, grandchildren Ernest, Frederick, Johanna and Elice²³.

Johanna died 1 November 1909, at home at age 88 and was buried in the Lutheran Cemetery, Middle Village, Queens, New York in the plot purchased by son, Gerhard Frederick®24®25.

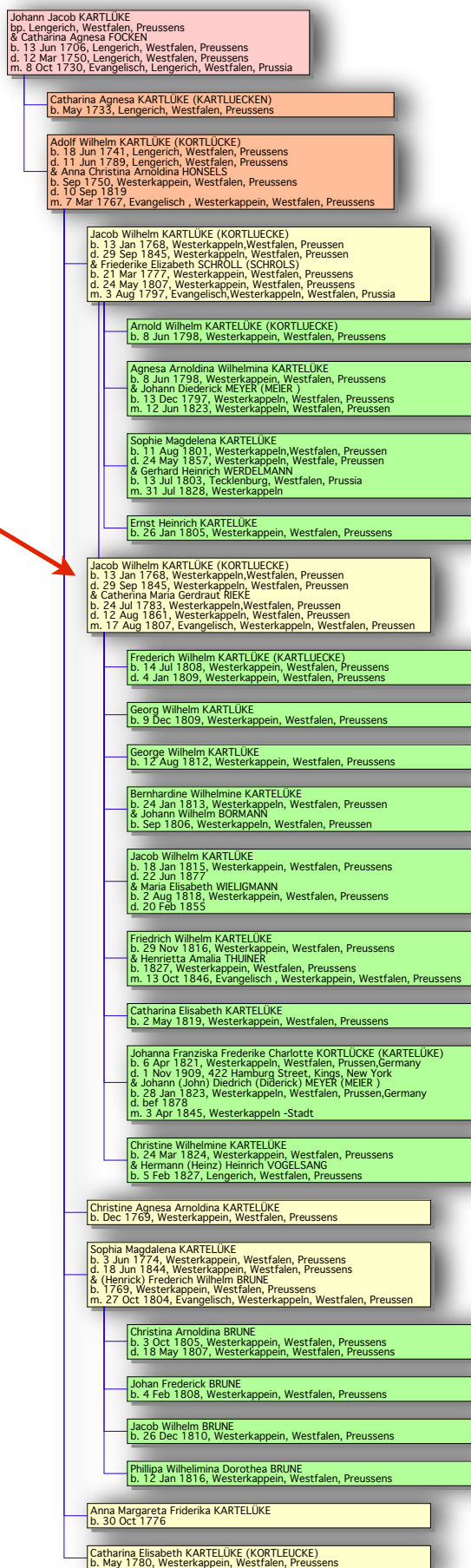

The Meyer/Kortlüke Connection, Our Earliest Kartlüke Ancestor

1 Johann Jacob KARTLÜKE



While researching the Meyer family, it became apparent to me that there was more than one Meyer/Kartlüke connection. We know that Johan Dietrick Meyer married Johanna Franziska Kortlüke in Westerkappeln before emigrating to the United States. Traveling with the family was William Kortlüke, the son of Johanna's brother, Jacob Wilhelm. After arriving in the United States, Johan and Johanna Meyer's son, Herman Wilhelm, married Johanna Hermina Kartlücke. I was determined to make the connection between the two families. When I received the marriage record of Herman and Johanna Hermina, it named Johanna Hermina's parents. Her father was the brother of Johanna Franziska Meyer and the William who came to America with the Meyers was Johanna Hermina's brother. Unfortunately, I have not been able to follow William Kartlücke. It is possible that he was naturalized in 1893, with Herman acting as his witness. Further connection will have to wait for the second edition of the family history!

The chart (see arrow) starts with the father of Johanna Kortlüke Meyer and Jacob Kortlüke, and progresses through three generation to indicate the connection. Following the chart of Jacob Wilhelm and Catharina Rieke, is the chart of the first marriage of Jacob Wilhelm and Friederike Elizabeth Schroll. They had a daughter, who also married a Johan Dietrick Meyer, and emigrated to Maryland. I have not been able to locate the family after their arrival in Baltimore, Maryland 1834.

The Meyer family information will be found in the chapter about the Meyer children. We will begin the Kartlücke connection with Johanna's father. (arrow on preceding chart).

47 at the time (figure 11). William arrived in New York in June 1862, with Aunt Johanna Kortlücke Meyer, her husband, John Meyer, and family³. He was found on the passenger list as Wilhelm Rantuske. I have viewed a copy of the Passenger Manifest and it clearly is Kortlücke³⁶ (figure 11 A). The transcriber misread it. On 15 August 1893, Henry W. Meyer was the witness for the naturalization of William Kartluke. Henry's address was 106 Christopher Street, New York City. William was living at 313 West 16th Street, New York City. It may be that William is the brother of Johanna, Henry's (Herman's spouse). Henry's brother John⁴⁷ and sister Minna⁴⁸⁴⁹ also lived at 106 Christopher Street, New York City⁵⁰.

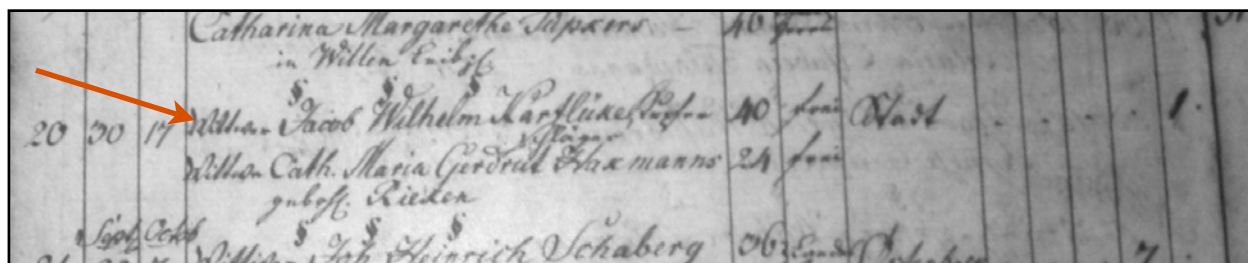

On 4 April 1834, the family was given a pass to emigrate. There was a note that Johan was on a list of Guard Regiment II Banns. It was also noted that he was a landlord³⁰. In May 1834, the family emigrated and arrived in Baltimore, Maryland. The passenger manifest listed *Died. Meyer from Westyerkapel, destination is Hagiston. MD*. The list included a male age 36, female age 34 and children. No names were recorded for those who were traveling with the named head of each group. There could be more than one child listed, but there is a large smudge on the record²⁰. I have not been able to locate the family after their arrival in Maryland.

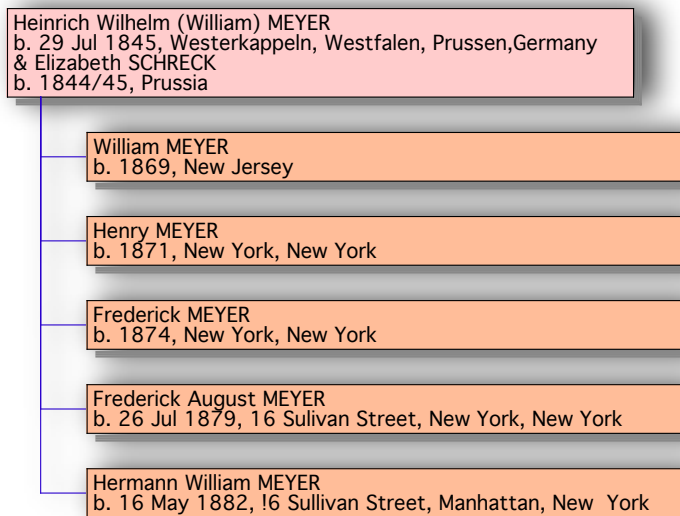

Present at the baptism of Heinrich Wilhelm (William) were his godparents, Gerhard Heinrich Werdelmann (uncle), Georg Wilhelm Reike (uncle), Anna Catharina Stallmann (grandmother)¹. It was customary to have the child named after the godparents. Heinrich emigrated on 14 April 1862 with the family, and arrived in New York on 9 June 1862. All the children traveled “between the decks” and their parents and grandmother, Catherina Stallman Meyer traveled on the second cabin²³. Heinrich may have been naturalized in 1868. A, William H. Meyer was living at 366 Bleeker Street and his witness was Henry W. Meyer, living at 198 Bleeker Street, New York⁴. We can assume that William Meyer and Elizabeth Schreck married some time about 1868-1869, as their first child was born in 1869⁹.

Elizabeth’s date of birth was estimated to be 1846, as her age on the 1880 census was 34. Her birthplace was listed as Prussia⁸. Her maiden name was noted on birth certificates of two youngest children¹⁰¹⁸.

In 1871, W. Meyer was a witness at brother Gerhard’s naturalization. He was living at 16 Sullivan Street, New York City⁵, which was his address in the 1880 census as well⁹. In 1872, Henry W. Meyer was witness for a Gerhard Schreck’s naturalization, on October 10, 1872. He was still living at 16 Sullivan Street, Manhattan. Could Gerhard Schreck be Elizabeth’s brother, father, or possibly a relative of his brother, Gerhard Meyer’s future wife, Gerhardine Schreck?⁶. It seems that Heinrich Wilhelm could not decide which name he was going to use. In 1873, Henry W. Meyer living at 16 Sullivan Street, was witness at his brother Bernhard Heinrich Meyer’s naturalization⁷ and in 1877, William was witness at sister Johanna’s marriage to Adolf Heimberg. He was still living at 16 Sullivan Street, Manhattan, New York⁸. In 1880, William Meyer was living in New York City, 16 Sullivan Street, Manhattan, New York with his wife Elizabeth, his children and his mother Johanna, a widow, as well as his younger brother, Dietrick. It was noted that his oldest son, William, was born in New Jersey⁹. Also living with them was

his brother, Herman, his wife Johanna, and their daughter, Amalia⁹. In 1882, at the time of the birth of their fifth child, the family was still living at 16 Sullivan Street, Manhattan, New York. Heinrich is thirty-seven years old and was working as a bottler¹⁰. In 1890, Henry W. Meyer was listed in New York City Directory as *Meyer Henry W. bottler, 115 Christopher, h 106 Christopher*¹¹. In 1893, Henry W. Meyer was the witness for the naturalization of William Kartlücke on August 15. His address was 106 Christopher Street, New York City. William Kartluke was living at 313 West 16th Street, New York City. It may be that William was his cousin. It is also noted that Henry's brother, John¹², and sister Minna¹³, ¹⁴ also lived at 106 Christopher Street, New York City¹⁵.

The constant of this address, 16 Sullivan Street, New York, was a very important fact in trying to locate family members and piecing together branches of the family tree. The last documentation I could find for Heinrich Wilhelm's family was in 1901. A, William and Elizabeth Meyer were witnesses at niece, Johanna Meyer Schroeder's marriage in September 1901¹⁶. A, Henry W. Meyer and Elise were witnesses at second marriage of brother Gerhard, November 1901¹⁷. This has not been verified as there is no address or age information to confirm the facts.

Editor's Notes/Theories: William and Elizabeth's first son William was born in New Jersey (age 11 in 1880 census), birth year was about 1868-9. William's grandmother was a midwife. William Sr's, parents, Johan and Johanna, were living in Jersey City, New Jersey, in the 1870 census. Son, William, and wife, Elizabeth may have gone to New Jersey for Grandma Anna Catharina to deliver him and she never filed a birth record. No marriage record was found for William/Elizabeth Meyer in New Jersey Archives Index search May 1867-May 1878. (Feb 18, 2009). A copy of a marriage record from the New Jersey Archives is a possibility, although no specific connection can be made: "*Henry W. Meyer of Union and Mary W. Schreck of New York City. Father's Dietrick M and Gerhard Sch. Henry is a grocer, date is November 22, 1868, Married by Rev. John (Pohn) Pustin*¹⁹."

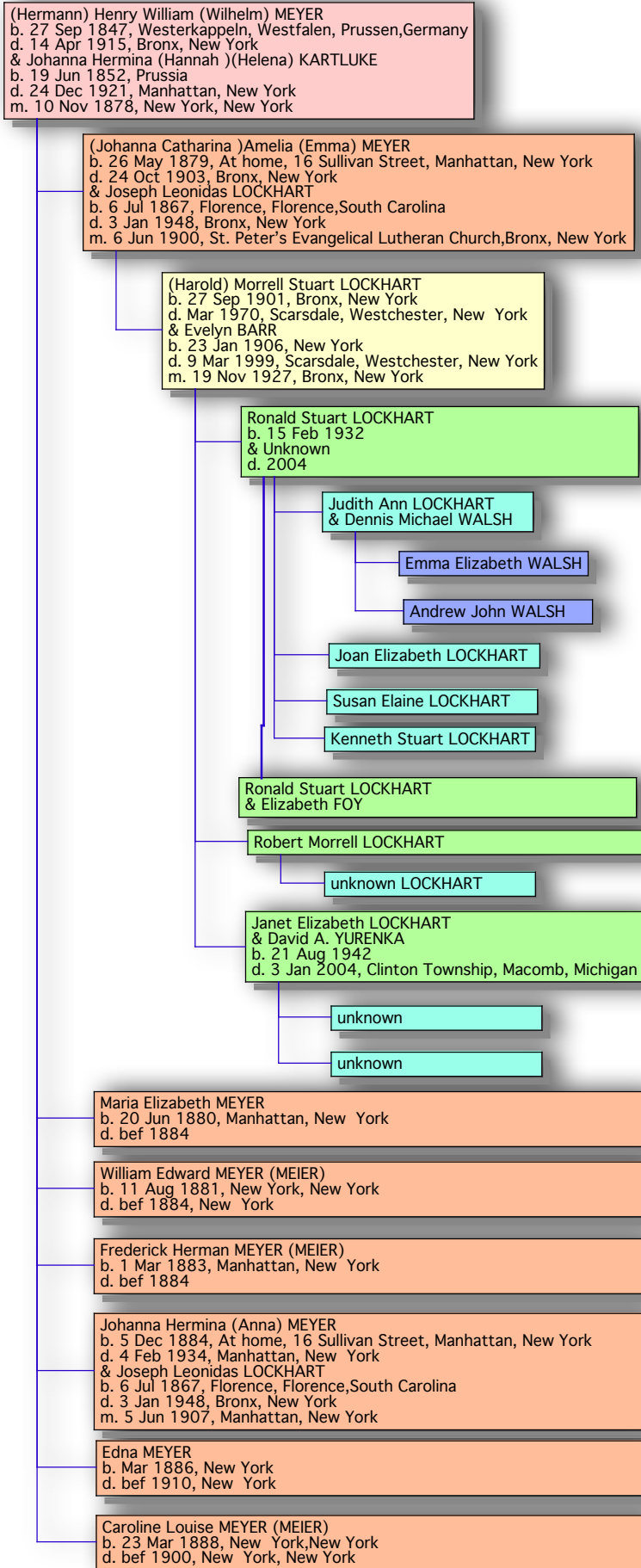

Herman was born on 27 September 1847 in Westerkappeln, Westfalen, Prussen. His godparents were Jacob Wilhelm Kartlück (grandfather), Johan Wilhelm Borman (uncle), Anna Catharina Reike (grandmother)¹. He emigrated on 14 April 1862, with his parents, grandmother and siblings from Westerkappeln, Westfalen, Prussen, Germany. He was also listed as MEIER on the passenger manifest³. On 13 October 1868, naturalization papers were filed for Wm. Hermann Meyer, living at 366 Bleeker Street, Manhattan, New York. His witness was his brother Henry W. Meyer, living at 198 Bleeker Street, Manhattan, New York⁴. In 1876, Herman was witness at brother Gerhard's marriage to Anna Marie Borne. He was living at 16 Sullivan Street, New York, at the time⁵. On 10 November 1878, (Hermann) Henry William (Wilhelm) married Johanna Hermina (Hannah)(Helena) KARTLÜKE. Herman was living at 16 Sullivan Street, Manhattan at time of marriage, and was working as a grocer. His father was Dietrick Meyer, noted to be deceased⁶.

Johanna Hermina (Hannah)(Helena) KARTLUKE, the daughter of Jacob Wilhelm KARTLÜKE (1815-1877) and Maria Elisabeth WIELIGMANN (1818-1855), was born on 19 June 1852 in Prussia¹⁵²⁰⁷⁶. Johanna was the niece of Johanna Kartlück Meyer. Her father, Jacob Wilhelm and Herman's mother, Johanna Meyer, were siblings, therefore, Herman and Johanna were cousins. Johanna immigrated in 1871¹⁵¹⁶. When she married Herman in 1878, she was living at 265 West 22 Street, Manhattan, New York⁶. Immigration documents have not been found.

On 10 November 1878, (Hermann) Henry William (Wilhelm) married Johanna Hermina (Hannah) (Helena) Kartlück, at the St. John's German Lutheran Church on Christopher Street, in New York, New York. Witnesses were Emma Lang and Ehler (signature could be BH) Meyer living at Tenth Avenue and 68 Street, New York. This was Herman's brother, Bernhard Meyer's address⁶. In 1880, Herman, was living at 16 Sullivan Street with his wife, Johanna, and daughter, Amalia⁷. They were living at the same address as his brother, William (Heinrich Wilhelm)⁸. Herman was employed as a grocer⁹ and we found him listed in the New York City Directory in 1890, as *Meyer Herman W. grocer 17 Grand, h 16 Sullivan*¹⁰. In 1893, Henry W. Meyer was the witness for the naturalization of William Kartlücke on August 15. Herman's address was 106 Christopher Street, New York City. William was living at 313 West 16th Street, New York City. He was a machinist. It may be that William was the brother of Johanna, Henry's (Herman) wife⁴⁰.

William Kartlücke emigrated with Aunt Johanna and her family³. It was noted that Henry's brother John¹¹, and sister Minna¹²¹³, were also living at 106 Christopher Street, New York City¹⁴. In 1900, Herman was living with his wife Johanna and daughters Emma, Johanna, Edna at 996 Kelly Street, Bronx, New York and he was naturalized¹⁵. [NOTE from Peter George Engeldrum: Emma Meyer,

daughter of Herman's brother Bernhard, was raised by uncle Herman and aunt Hannah Meyer according to Emma's sister, Ella Meyer Lindberg. This was after Bernhard and his wife Carrie died. This would have been from about 1900 through 1906, until Emma married]. In 1910, Herman W. and Johanna Meyer were living at 800 East 152nd Street, Bronx with their surviving daughter Johanna, her husband, Joseph Lockhart and his eight year old son. Johanna had six children one was living¹⁶. Hermann (Henry William Wilhelm) died in the Bronx, New York, on 14 April 1915, he was 67. Herman was buried on 17 April 1915 in the Lutheran Cemetery, Middle Village, Queens, New York¹⁹¹⁷¹⁸. After Herman died, we found his widow, Johanna Kartlück Meyer, in 1920, living on Fort Washington Avenue, Bronx, New York, with her daughter, Anna (Johanna) Lockhart, her husband Joseph and grandson Morrell, age eighteen. Johanna gave the year of her immigration as 1875 and naturalization 1878²¹. [NOTE: From 1790 to 1922, a wife became naturalized through her husband's filing. After September 22, 1922, a married woman had to be naturalized on her own. Children under the age of 21 became citizens automatically by naturalization of their parents]. Johanna Hermina (Hannah)(Helena) Kartlück Meyer died in Manhattan, New York, on 24 December 1921, she was 69 years old. Johanna was buried on 28 December 1921 in the Lutheran Cemetery, Middle Village, Queens, New York ¹⁷²²²³.

In 1880, she was living with her parents at 16 Sullivan Street, Manhattan, New York⁷ and in 1900, she was listed as Emma, in the census with her parents, and sisters, Johanna and Edna¹⁵. On 6 June 1900, Emilie Johanna Meyer {(Johanna Catharina) Amelia (Emma)}, age 21, married Joseph Leonidas Lockhart, son of William Jones Lockhart (1817-1903) and Cassandra HILL (1829~1880), in the St. Peter's Evangelical Lutheran Church, Bronx, New York²⁵. Joseph Leonidas LOCKHART, was born on 6 July 1867 in Florence, Florence, South Carolina²⁷. In 1870-1880 he was living in Darlington, South Carolina with his parents and seven siblings²⁸²⁹. Joseph came to New York, with two of his brothers, Paul and Benjamin, after the Civil War, probably in the 1890s ¹⁷³⁰. On 6 June 1900, he married Emilie Johanna Meyer²⁵. Johanna Catharina Amelia (Emma) died in the Bronx, New York, on 24 October 1903, she was twenty four years old²⁶. She was buried in the Lutheran Cemetery, Middle Village, Queens, New York, along with the other children of Herman Meyer and Johanna Kartlücke Meyer

2.2. Maria Elizabeth MEYER was born on 20 June 1880 in New York New York. In 1880, Herman and Johanna Meyer were living at 16 Sullivan Street, Manhattan, New York with their daughter Amalia, (census taken June 5). Maria was born after the census was taken⁷³⁴. On sister, Johanna Hermina's, birth certificate, in 1884, mother had only two children out of five still living⁹. Maria Elizabeth was not listed with the family in 1900 in the Bronx, New York. We can assume Maria Elizabeth died before 1884¹⁵.

2.3. William Edward MEYER was born on 11 August 1881 in New York, New York³⁵. In 1884, mother had only two living children, Johanna Amelia and Johanna Hermina⁹. William Edward was not listed with the family in 1900. We can assume he died before 1884¹⁵¹⁶.

2.4. Frederick Herman MEYER was born on 1 March 1883 in New York, New York. ³⁶ On sister, Johanna Hermina's, birth certificate, in 1884, mother had only two children out of five still living⁹.

Frederick Herman was not listed with the family in 1900. We can assume he died before 1884@15@16.

2.5. Johanna Hermina (Anna) MEYER was born on 5 December 1884 at home, 16 Sullivan Street, Manhattan, New York@9. In 1900 she was living with her parents, and sisters, Emma, and Edna at 996 Kelly Street, Bronx, New York@15. After her oldest sister, Emilie (Johanna Catharina), died, Johanna Hermina (Anna) Meyer married her brother-in-law, Joseph Leonidas LOCKHART, on 5 June 1907 in New York@31@37. In 1910, her parents Herman W. and Johanna Meyer were living at 800 East 152nd Street, Bronx, New York with Johanna (Anna), her husband Joseph Lockhart, and his eight year old son, (actually her nephew). Joseph was employed as a bank superintendent@16. In 1920, Joseph, Anna and son, Morrell, age eighteen, were living on Fort Washington Avenue, Bronx, New York, with her widowed mother, Johanna Meyer@21. In 1930, Anna and Joseph were at living at 720 Grand Concourse, Bronx, New York@32. Johanna Hermina (Anna) died in New York, New York, on 4 February 1934, at age 49@38. Joseph Leonidas died in the Bronx, New York, on 3 January 1948. He was 80 years old@27@33. They had no children.

2.6. Edna MEYER was born in March 1886 in New York@9. In 1900, Edna was listed in the census with parents, and sisters, Emma and Johanna, living at 996 Kelly Street, Bronx, New York@15. In 1910, Herman W. and Johanna Meyer, were living at 800 East 152nd Street, Bronx with their daughter, Johanna, her husband Joseph Lockhart, and his eight year old son. Johanna had six children, only one was still living@16. We can assume Edna died in New York, before the 1910 census@16.

2.7. Caroline Louise MEYER was born on 23 March 1888 in New York, New York@39. She was not listed in the 1900 census@15. NOTE: There is a Caroline Meyer, age 4, who died 19 February 1892 in Manhattan, certificate #6298.

Gerhard (Frederich) MEYER was born on 16 December 1849, in Westerkappeln, Westfalen, Preußen. His godparents were Frederick Wilhelm Kartlück (uncle), Gerhard Heinrich Werdelmann (uncle)①. Gerhard emigrated on 14 April 1862 along with his parents, grandmother, and siblings arriving in New York on 9 June 1862②. He was listed as Diedrick MEIER on the manifest③. Gerhard was naturalized in 1871. He was living at 1420 Broadway, New York City, working as a grocer at the time. His witness was his brother, W. Meyer, living at 16 Sullivan Street, New York④. On 18 November 1876, Gerhard married Anna Marie Borne, daughter of William BORNE (1835-<1910) and Barbara BORNE (1838-1921). Gerhard was living at 528 Ninth Avenue at time of marriage⑤.

Anna Maria (Elizabeth) BORNE, was born in December 1856 in New York, New York⑤ or Pennsylvania⑬. Her name was Anna Borne on William's death certificate⑬, and Elizabeth Born on Henry's marriage certificate⑮. In 1876, when Anna married Gerhard, she was living at 456 Ninth Avenue New York, New York⑤ On 18, November 1876, Gerhard married Anna Marie Borne in the St. John's German Lutheran Church, Manhattan, New York. Witnesses were his brother Hermann Meyer, of 16 Sullivan Street, New York and Anna's sister Carrie Borne, living at 456 Ninth Avenue, New York⑤.

In 1880, Gerhard and Anna were living in an apartment at 46 Jackson Street, New York City, with son William, daughter Johanna, and "daughter" Minnie. It is possible Minnie was Gerhard's youngest sister. As we know, the family was separated, probably due to the death of Johan Meyer. Gerhard was working as a driver. Also living in the apartment was a John Meyer, age 36, wife, Meta and 3 children⑦⑧. No connection has been made between John Meyer and our Meyer branch. Anna Maria (Elizabeth) died in at home, 1383 Third Avenue, New York, New York, on 14 June 1891, at the age of 34 years. The cause of her death was *Phthisis Pulonalis*, (Tuberculosis) and *Asthenia* (weakness). She was buried on 15 June 1891 in the Weehawken Cemetery, Weehawken, New Jersey⑯. The price of the burial for Anna was \$5.00⑰ ⑱. Edith Rogers recalled that Anna gave birth to a baby born with a lump on its neck (Anna had TB). Anna's sister, Mamie Borne, later Köhler, took care of the baby until it died, date unknown⑲.

Gerhardine was born on 9 May 1850 in Westphalia, Germany¹⁰²¹ and emigrated in 1868⁷¹⁰. In 1880, Gerhadine was living at 1975 Third Ave, Manhattan, New York with her husband, Raymond Alfonzo and three children, William, Frank, and Elizabeth. Gerhard was living in Hoboken, New Jersey at the time of his marriage in 1891. We have no documents to verify his address from the time Anna died until his remarriage in 1891. Gerhardine Schreck Alfonzo married Gerhard Frederick Meyer 14 November 1891. Witnesses were Henry W. Meyer and Elise Meyer. Is this Gerhard's brother Henry William and wife, Elizabeth? We don't know, as no address was given on the marriage record¹⁸¹⁹¹⁰⁹. In the 1900 census, Gerhard had been married eight years, had no children with wife, Gerhardine and his occupation was a driver. Gerhard and Geraldine were living with her two children, and his sons William, Frederick, Henry, and his daughter, Minnie. They were living in rented apartment at 310 122nd Street, Manhattan, New York⁷ ¹⁰. Gerhard (Frederich) died at home, 1684 Second Ave, Manhattan, New York, on 11 June 1902, at the age of 52 years. Cause of his death was *Acute Pulmonary Tuberculosis*. He was buried on 15 June 1902 in the Lutheran Cemetery, Middle Village, Queens, New York¹¹¹².

After Gerhard's death, Gerhardine lived at 1654 Second Avenue, New York¹². Gerhardine died at 72 West 109th Street, Manhattan, New York, on 20 November 1913, at 63 years of age. Gerhardine was buried on 23 November 1913 in the Lutheran Cemetery, Middle Village, New York¹¹. Wm. A. Meyer was the informant (probably her son). He listed Gerhardine's parents as Gerhard Schreck and Wilhelmine Vogelsang²². Research has not been able to verify this information. It should be noted that Gerhard's brother, Henry W. Meyer, was witness for a Gerhard Schreck's naturalization on 10 October 1872. Henry was living at 16 Sullivan Street, Manhattan. It is possible that Gerhard Schreck was Henry's wife, Elizabeth's brother, or father or possibly a relative of his brother Gerhard's second wife, Gerhardine Schreck²⁰. This is for the next edition. Together they had no children. Gerhardine had the following children:

3.1. Elizabeth (Lizzie) MEYER was born between 1876-1878²³. She was cared for by her sister Minnie until she died²⁴¹⁴. Elizabeth (Lizzie) married but no information is available. She had no children.

3.2. Johanna Conradina (Hannah) MEYER was born on 13 August 1877 in New York, New York⁷ ²³. In 1880, she was living in an apartment at 46 Jackson Street, New York City, with her parents and brother William⁷⁸. On 8 September 1901, when Johanna Conradina (Hannah) was 24, she married Herman Adolf SCHROEDER (Jr.), son of Hermann SCHROEDER Sr., (->1914) and Mary (Hillary). She was living at 1684 Second Avenue, New York at time of her marriage²⁵. Herman Adolf SCHROEDER was born on 6 July 1880 in New York, New York³⁴²⁵. In 1901, at the time of his marriage he was living at 495 Gardner Street, Union, New Jersey ²⁵²³³⁵. Johanna and Herman were married in the St. John's Lutheran Church, Harlem, Manhattan, New York on 9 September 1901. Witnesses were William Meyer and Elizabeth Meyer (aunt & uncle?). We are assuming this was her father, Gerhard's oldest brother, but we have no documented proof²⁵. Notations from a descendant of Johanna Conradina Meyer, state she cared for her sister Minnie Meyer, brother Henry Meyer and also the son of

her cousin, William C. Meyer Sr., William, after she married Herman Schroeder. In 1910, the family, with three children, were living with her brother, Fred in Union City, New Jersey²⁶. In 1917 the family was living on Bergenline Avenue, Union Hill, New Jersey³⁴. In 1920, the family was still living in Hudson County, New Jersey and Herman was working as a foreman²⁷. In 1935, Mrs H. Schroeder Sr., attended the wedding of her nephew, Edward Rogers²⁸. In 1942, Johanna and Herman were living on 38th Street, Union City, New Jersey ²⁹. Johanna Conradina (Hannah) died in the Masonic Home, Burlington, New Jersey, on 1 October 1972, at the age of 95 years. She was buried in the Cresthaven Cemetery, Nutley, Passaic, New Jersey³⁰ ³¹³²³³. Herman Adolf was a member of the Masonic Masons³¹, and he died in the Masonic Home, Burlington, New Jersey. He was buried in the Cresthaven Cemetery, Nutley, Passaic, New Jersey³³³²

3.3. William Charles MEYER was born on 19 January 1879 in New York, New York¹³. In 1880, he was living in the apartment at 46 Jackson Street, New York City, with his parents and sister Hannah⁷⁸. In 1900, William was living with his father, stepmother, brothers Frederick, Henry, sister, Minnie, stepsister and stepbrother. They were living in a rented apartment at 310 122nd Street, Manhattan, New York⁷¹⁰. On 2 November 1902, when William Charles was 23, he married Pauline Katherine BLUM³⁶³⁷. Pauline Katherine BLUM, the daughter of Conrad BLUM (1852-) and Elizabeth LEFFERT (1855-), was born on 29 April 1882 in New York⁴⁴. Prior to her marriage, she was living with her parents, brother, and sister at 346 East 89th Street, Manhattan, New York⁴⁵. After their marriage, William, his wife Pauline, and their son, William, were living in New York in 1910. William was employed as a necktie manufacturer³⁷. Pauline Katherine died at home, at 318 East 89th Street, Manhattan, New York, on 13 December 1914, at the age of 32 years. She was buried on 16 December 1914 in the Lutheran Cemetery, Middle Village, Queens, New York⁴⁴.

After Pauline's death, William married his cousin, Charlotte Wilamina MEYER³⁸, daughter of his uncle Bernhard Heinrich MEYER (1852-1893) and aunt Caroline (Carrie) SCHLAGETER (1859-1900) in 1917. Charlotte was born in New York on 19 October 1888 in New York, New York⁴⁶. Charlotte and William were cousins, as their fathers were brothers. After the death of her parents, we found Charlotte living at the "Children's Fold", at West 155th Street, Manhattan with her younger sister, Ella in 1900. They were listed as pupils, and her birthdate was given as October 1889⁴⁷. After leaving the "Children's Fold", and prior to her marriage, Charlotte was living with her brother-in-law, George P. Engeldrum, and her sister Emma in the Bronx, New York⁴⁸ ³⁸. In 1920, after Charlotte and William married, they were listed as roomers with son, William Jr., age seventeen, living at 107 Aqueduct Avenue, Bronx, New York³⁹. It was probably soon thereafter that his son, William Jr., went to live with his aunt Johanna Conradina Schroeder. In 1930, William and Charlotte were living at 799 Jennings Street, in the Bronx, New York. That was the address of Charlotte's sister, Emma Meyer Engeldrum³⁸. In 1935, Mr and Mrs W.C. Meyer attended the wedding of his cousin Edward Rogers²⁸. In July 1938, they visited Charlotte's newlywed nephew, George Engeldrum. They were living at 3029 Briggs Avenue, Bronx, New York, through 1943⁴⁰.

William was employed by the Norwich Union Insurance Company as a printer⁴¹. William Charles died in the Mt. Sinai, Hospital, Manhattan, New York, on 11 October 1943, at the age of 64 years. William was buried on 14 October 1943 in the Lutheran Cemetery, Middle Village, Queens, New York, in the Bernhard Meyer family plot⁴²⁴³. Charlotte Wilamina died in the House of Calvary, Bronx, New York, on 26 January 1946, at the age of 57. The cause of her death was *Carcinoma of the Cervix*. She was living with her sister, Ella Lindberg, at 273 East 164th Street, Bronx, New York at the time of her death⁵⁰⁴²⁴³⁴⁶. Charlotte was buried on 29 January 1946 in the Lutheran Cemetery, Middle Village, Queens, New York in the Bernhard Meyer family plot⁴³. They had no children.

3.4 Frederick William MEYER was born on 11 August 1880 in New York, New York¹⁰⁵¹. In 1900, he was living with his father, stepmother, brothers, William, Henry, sister Minnie and stepsister and step brother. They were living in a rented apartment at 310 122nd Street, Manhattan, New York⁷¹⁰. Through April 1910, he was living with his sister Johanna and her husband Herman Schroeder and family in Union City, New Jersey²⁶. Later in 1910, Frederick William married Anna K. SPONAR, daughter of Alouis SPONAR (1868-1920) and Catharina (Katerina) KAU (1862-)⁵² ⁵⁴. Anna was born in March 1884 in Germany²³⁵⁶. She emigrated in 1886 from *Ger. Germany* with her mother²³. In 1898, her father, Alouis, age 41, returned from a trip abroad with his wife, Catharina, age 37, and daughters, Anna, age fourteen, and Catharina, age eleven. They sailed from Antwerp, 24 September 1898, and arrived in New York, 4 October 1898. They were all listed as American citizens returning to Paterson, New Jersey⁵⁷. In 1900, Anna was living with her parents and sister on Morgan Street, Union City, Hudson, New Jersey⁵⁶.

Anna married Mr. Maile sometime between 1900-1906. Their daughter, Anna, was born in 1905. She gave her age at her first marriage, as twenty-one⁵². In 1910, she was living in North Bergen, Hudson, New Jersey with her daughter Anna, age four, her parents and her younger sister Catharina, She was listed as widow. The census was taken in April⁵⁸. She married after April 1910, as she was widowed when she married Frederick²³. In 1920 Fred and his wife, Anna, and three children were living with his mother-in-law at 446 Park Place, Brooklyn, New York. He was working as a salesman for a bake shop and Anna was working as a waitress in a bake shop⁵³²⁶. By 1930, the family had moved to New Jersey. Fred, his wife, two daughters, and mother-in-law, Catherine Sponar, were living in Middletown, Monmouth, New Jersey. Fred owned his own home, \$10,000 value, and even owned a radio!⁵². He operated a delicatessen in Leonardo, New Jersey⁵⁴⁵⁵. In 1942, the family was living at Brevent and Center Street, Leonardo, New Jersey. He now owned his own business. It is interesting that his contact person, on his WWII registration, was his sister Johanna Schroeder, at 38th in Union City, New Jersey²⁹. Frederick William died in New Jersey, in 1962, at the age of 81. He was buried in the Leonardo Cemetery, Leonardo, Monmouth, New Jersey⁵⁴⁵⁵. After Fred died, Anna lived with her granddaughter, Sandra English, for awhile and died when she was in her 90's⁵⁹. She was buried in the Leonardo Cemetery, Leonardo, Monmouth, New Jersey⁵⁵.

3.5. Minnie Wilhelmine MEYER was born on 16 July 1886 at home, 235 E. 82nd Street, Manhattan, New York⁶⁰¹⁰⁶¹. In 1900, Minnie was living in rented apt at 310 122nd Street, Manhattan, New York with her father, stepmother, brothers Frederick, Henry, William, and stepsister and stepbrother¹⁰. In 1902, at age sixteen, she went to live with sister Johanna, along with her brother Henry, as she did not get along with stepmother²⁴. According to recollections by Edith Rogers, of stories her mother, Minnie told her, Geraldine was the stereotypical definition of stepmother. Her stepsister, Mary, was not much better, only her stepbrother, William, supported her¹⁴. In 1909, when Minnie Wilhelmine was twenty-two, she married Charles Lemuel ROGERS, son of Edward Alzmore ROGERS (1857-1925) and Edna Searing KETCHEM (1855-1928). Charles Lemuel ROGERS, was born on 22 January 1887 at home, 92 Charles Street, New York, New York⁶⁰. Minnie and Charles were married 31 March 1909 in the St. John's Lutheran Church, Union City, Hudson, New Jersey⁶². Witnesses were M. Otte and Henry Meyer (Minnie's brother?)⁶⁰ In 1910, Minnie and Charles were living in Union City, Ward 3, Hudson, New Jersey⁶³. They lived at 309 Elm Street, West Hoboken, New Jersey on the first floor. Minnie's cousin, Henry Meyer, and his wife Katherine Miller Meyer, lived on the second floor⁸⁴. Minnie cared for her sister Elizabeth until Elizabeths death (date unknown)²⁴.

In 1917, when Charles registered for World War I Draft, the family was living at 66 Sandy Hollow Road, Port Washington, Nassau, New York. He was employed as an Express Clerk⁶⁸. In 1920, Minnie, her husband and three children were living in North Hempstead, Nassau, New York⁶⁴. By 1930, the Rogers' and their four children had returned to New Jersey and were living in Union City. Charles was employed as a teamster, working at a dye company with son-in-law, Charles Bierl⁶⁵. Minnie

Wilhelmine died at her daughter, Edith Rogers Bierl's home in Union City, New Jersey, on 4 May 1955, at the age of 68. The cause of death was *Cancer*. Minnie was buried on 7 May 1955 in the Crest Haven Cemetery, Clifton, New Jersey Plot 25, Lot 25, Block 1 Section palm grave 3@60@66@67. Charles Lemuel died in the Good Samaritan Hospital, West Islip, Suffolk, New York, on 22 January 1965, at the age of 78 years. Charles was buried on 25 January 1965 in the Crest Haven Cemetery, Clifton, New Jersey. Plot 25 Lot 25, Block 1 Section palm grave 1@6@66@67.

3.6. Henry (Henny) Theodore MEYER SR. was born on 4 May 1888 in New York, New York@10. In 1900, he was living with his father, stepmother, brothers, Frederick, William, sister, Minnie, stepsister and stepbrother in a rented apartment at 310 122nd Street. Manhattan, New York@10. Descendants of Johanna Conradina Meyer, stated that she cared for sister Minnie Meyer, Henry Meyer and also son of William Meyer Sr., after she married Herman Schroeder@14. In 1909, Henry married Ada Marie KOEPKE, daughter of Louis J. KOEPKE (1862-) and Elizabeth BUHL (1865-)@15. Ada Marie KOEPKE, was born on 13 October 1885 in New York, New York@74@36. Prior to her marriage she was living on Ninth Avenue, Manhattan, with her parents and three siblings@74. Henry and Ada were married in the Evangelical Lutheran Church, Manhattan, New York, 22 December 1909@15. When Henry registered for the draft in 1917, he and Ada were living at 332 Waverly, Richmond Hill, Queens, New York@69. They were still in Queens in 1920 at 8647 Eleventh Street, Richmond Hills. Henry was employed as a chauffeur for a caterer@70. A significant note is that the 1930 census was taken April 10, and he and his spouse were living on Franklin Avenue, Brooklyn, New York. Henry owned his home and had been married for 20 years, and was employed by the catering company as a chauffeur. [Son Henry was born April 16, 1930].

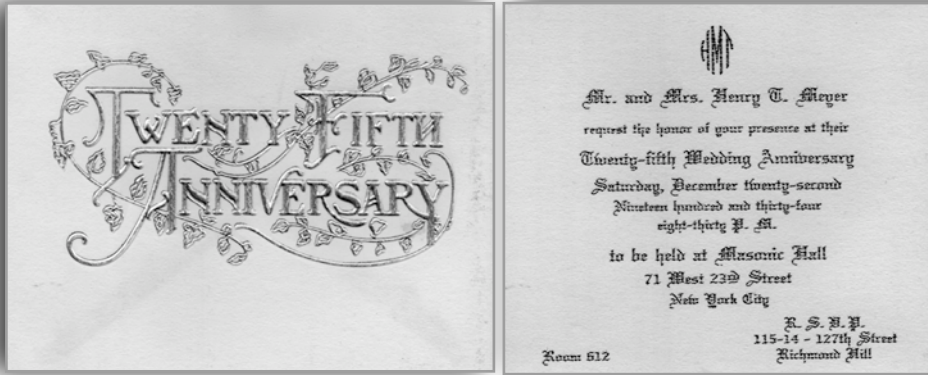


Figure 16. Invitation to 25th Anniversary Celebration for Mr. And Mrs. Henry T. Meyer (Ada Kopeke Meyer and Henry Theodore Meyer Sr.) on December 22, 1934. New York, New York.

According to Carol Rogers Baum (great niece), they did not have any children until after they were married 20 years, which was substantiated in the 1930 census@71. On December 22, 1934, the Meyer family celebrated the 25th Wedding Anniversary of Henry and Ada Meyer in the Masonic Hall, 71 West 23rd Street, New York@72 (figure 16). Son, Henry was born six days after the 1930 census was taken@36. In 1942, Henry Theodore Meyer was living at 115-14 127th Street, Queens, New York, he was self-employed and worked at 721 Franklin Avenue, Brooklyn, New York@73. Ada Marie Meyer, died in New York, New York, on 2 January 1956. She was 70 years old@36. Henry (Henny) Theodore died on 21 November 1960, at age 72 years. He was buried in the Maple Grove Cemetery, Kew Gardens, Queens, New York@36.

3.7. MEYER. Unknown child was born about 1891. Edith Rogers, recalled, in her recollections, that Anna gave birth to a baby born with a lump on its neck (Anna had Tuberculosis). Anna's sister, Mamie Borne, later Köhler, took care of the baby until it died. No further information is known.

3.8. William ALFONZO (MEYER) was born on 6 November 1872 in New York@10@18@75. In 1880, William was living with his parents, Raymond and Geraldine Schreck Alfonzo, and two siblings in Manhattan, New York@21. In 1900, he was listed with his mother, Geraldine, stepfather Frederick and Frederick's children, William, Frederick, Minnie and Henry. They were living in a rented apartment at 310 122nd Street. Manhattan, New York@7@10. In 1910, we found William A., age 38, living as a boarder, in Queens, New York with John and Kate (Catherine) Scalone Martin and their children, Grace, and Howard, and Kate's mother, Annie DePatty@76. Some time after 1910, when William was 38, he married Catherine Scalone MARTIN. Catherine SCALONE MARTIN was born in 1876 in New York, New York@11@18@79. We can assume that John Martin Scalone died between 1910-1920 as Catherine is married to William A. Meyer in the 1920 census@77.

In 1917, William registered for the draft and gave his name as William Alfonzo Meyer. He was living at

In 1917, William registered for the draft and gave his name as William Alfonzo Meyer. He was living at 2336 Putnam Avenue, Ridgewood, Queens, New York. The image is incomplete, so I cannot determine his marital status⁷⁵. It is possible he was already married to Catherine. In 1920, he was living with his wife, Katherine, and stepchildren Grace and Howard Martin at 2336 Putnam Avenue, Queens, New York. He stated his father was born in Germany. It is possible that his stepfather, Gerhard, adopted William, as he has the surname, Meyer, on his death certificate⁷⁷¹¹. In 1930, he and Katherine were still living in Queens, at 5928 Putnam Avenue. William was a self-employed plumber⁷⁸. The family was living at 59-30 Putnam Avenue, Kings, New York at time of William's death¹⁸. (I believe the borough at time of death is incorrect). William died in the Goldwater Memorial Hospital, Manhattan, New York on 20 December 1942, at the age of 70. He was buried on 23 December 1942 in the Lutheran Cemetery, Middle Village, Queens, New York¹¹. His death certificate listed the name of his father as Raymond, mother, Geraldine Scheck. Raymond was the name of Geraldine's first husband, before she married Frederick. His name is WILLIAM MEYER on his death certificate¹⁸. Catherine died in the Queens General Hospital, Queens, New York, in 1959, she was 83 years old. She was buried on 21 March 1959 in the All Faiths Lutheran Cemetery, Middle Village, Queens, New York in the Gerhard Meyer family plot¹¹.

3.9. Frank G. ALFONZO was born in 1876 in New York¹⁰. Frank G. died in Manhattan, New York, on 30 January 1918, at the age of 42⁸⁵. Two of his children, Gerard F. (1906-1906) and Geroge H. (1911-1911), died as infants and were buried in the Gerhard Frederick Meyer Plot in the All Faith's Lutheran Cemetery, Middle Village, Queens, New York¹¹.

3.10. Elizabeth ALFONZO was born in 1879 in New York¹⁰.

3.11. (Marie) Mary Wilhelmina ALFONZO was born on 14 September 1880 in Manhattan, New York¹⁰⁸⁰¹⁹. In 1900, she was listed with her mother, Geraldine, stepfather, Frederick, sibling and step siblings, living in a rented apartment at 310 122nd Street, Manhattan, New York⁷¹⁰. On 13 September 1905, (Marie) Mary Wilhelmina married John Lyon THOMPSON, son of John THOMPSON and Frances, in Manhattan, New York. She was living at 102 East 117 Street, Manhattan at time of her marriage⁸¹. John Lyon THOMPSON, was born on 24 October 1875 in New York, New York⁸¹⁸³. John was a widower living at 102 East 117th Street, Manhattan at time of his marriage⁸⁰. John and Mary were married by H.C. Stemp 118 East 121 Street, Manhattan, New York, the same clergyman who married Johanna Meyer and Herman Schroeder and Mary's mother, Geraldine Schreck Alonzo and Gerhard Meyer. She gave her age as 25. Her father was Raymond, and mother's maiden name is Gerhardine, obviously incorrect⁸⁰. In 1917, John and Mary Thompson were living at 9 Carlton Avenue, Brooklyn, New York. John was working as brakeman for Long Island railroad⁸³. John Thompson died before 1920¹⁹⁸². They had no children.

She gave her age as 49⁸². In 1932, Mary and Joseph were living at 328 Fourth Avenue, Brooklyn, New York¹⁹. (Marie) Mary Wilhelmina died in New York Cancer Institute, Manhattan, New York, on 26 August 1932, she was 51 years old. Mary was buried on 30 August 1932 in Lutheran Cemetery, Middle Village New York in the Gerhard Meyer plot¹⁹¹¹. John was living at 328 Fourth Ave, Brooklyn, New York at time of his wife's death¹⁹. Joseph died after 1932. They had no children.

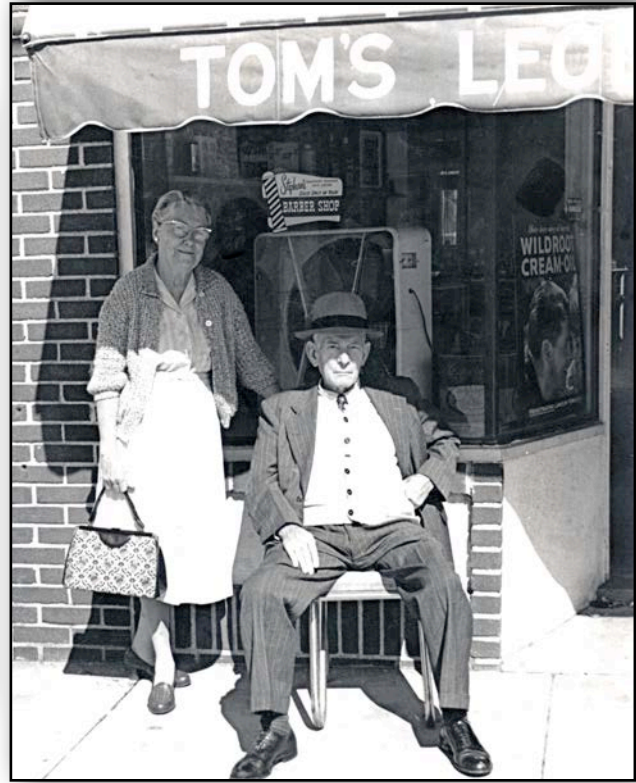

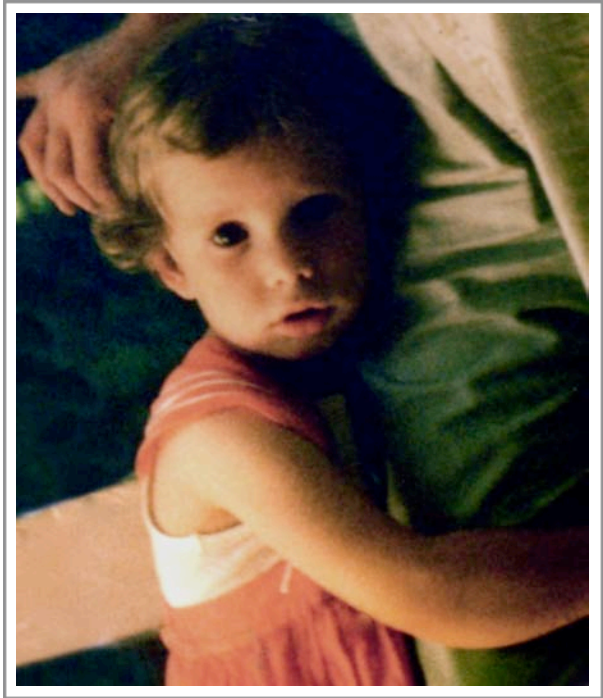

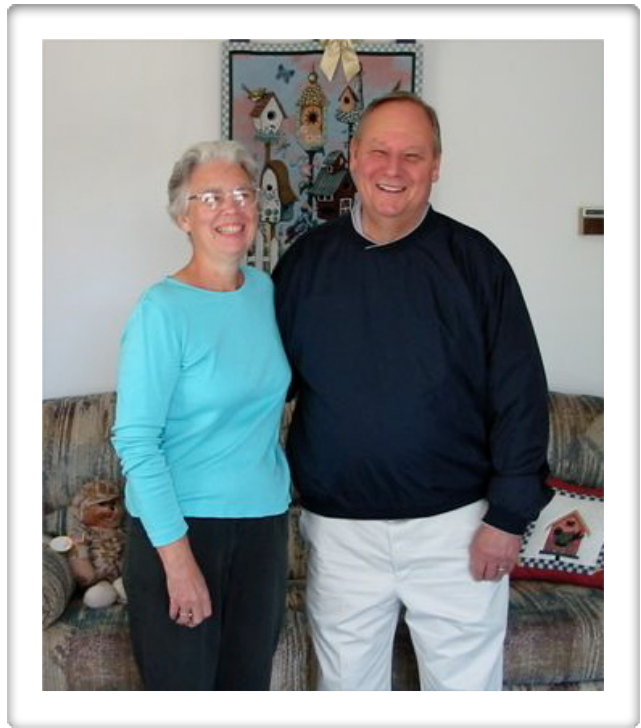

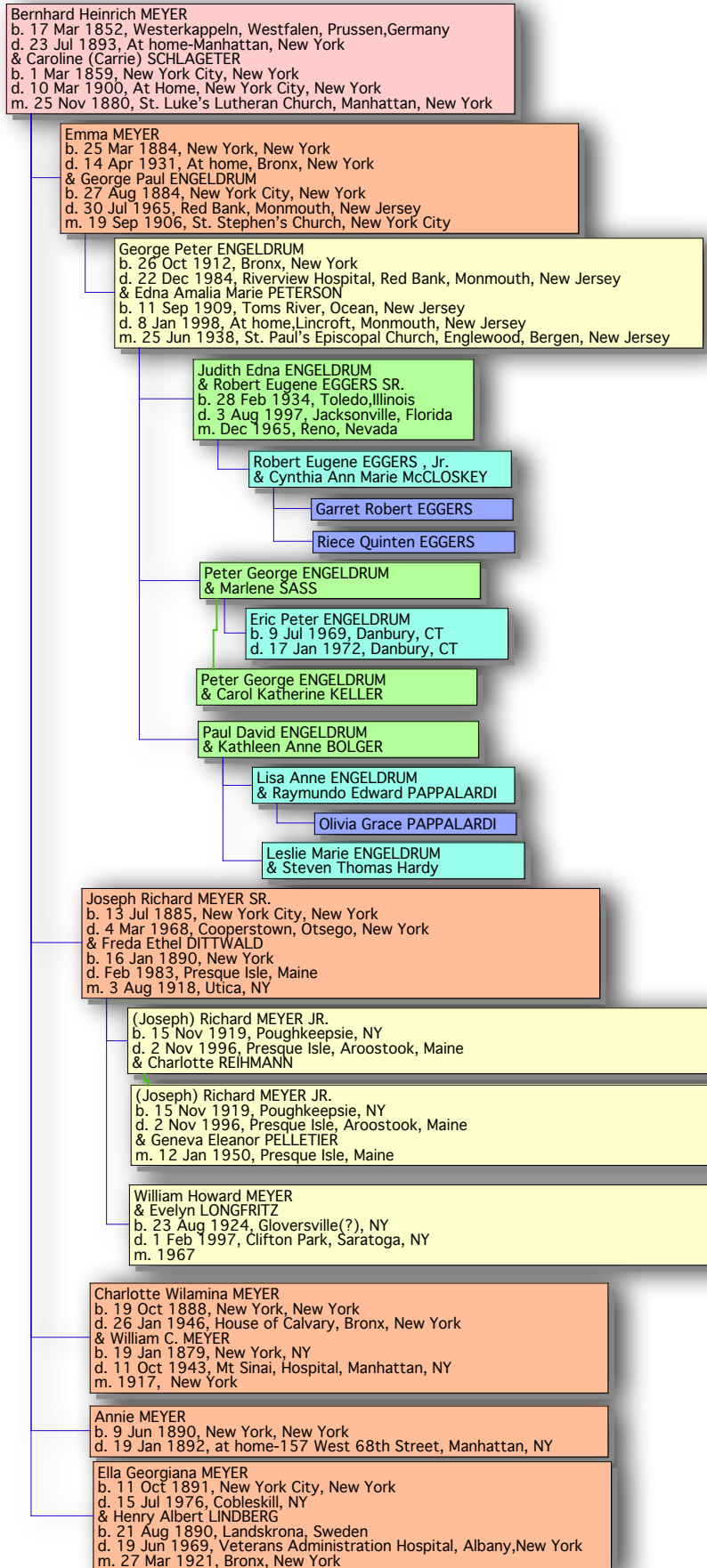

Bernhard Heinrich Meyer was born in Westerkappeln, Westfalen, Preußen¹². When he was baptized on 14 April 1852, his godparents were Bernhard Friedrich Wilhelm Werdelmann (cousin), Johann Heinrich Hakmann, and Catharina Elisabeth Hinnah². Bernhard emigrated along with his family in April 1862. He too, was listed as MEIER on the passenger list³⁴. The family arrived in New York on 9 June 1862⁵⁴³. Bernhard was naturalized on 13 October 1873. He was living at 552 Hudson Street, Manhattan, New York and working as a grocer, at the time. His brother Henry W. who was living at 16 Sullivan Street, Manhattan, was his witness. He was naturalized as a minor⁶. This also supports the fact that Johan Meyer was not naturalized as he stated on the 1870 census⁹¹. In 1875, Bernhard was the witness for Adolf Heimberg's naturalization. Adolph, was soon to become Bernhard's sister, Johanna's husband. Adolph was living at 840 Ninth Avenue, Manhattan, New York⁷. In 1878, it is possible that Bernhard was a witness at his brother Herman's wedding. The witness is EHLER, but signature looks like BH Meyer living at Tenth Avenue and 68th Street, New York¹²⁴. In 1880, Bernhard was living with two other boarders, Frank Blinn, age seventeen and August Eischen, age fifteen on Tenth Avenue between 67 and 68 Street, Manhattan, and he was employed as a grocer. He was listed as B.H. Meyer age 28⁸. On 25 November 1880, Bernhard married Caroline (Carrie) SCHLAGETER, daughter of Mathias SCHLAGETER (1825-1899) and Fredericka (Frieda) LICHTENBERGER (1831-1891). He was living at Tenth Avenue and 68th Street, New York, New York at time of his marriage⁹.

Caroline (Carrie) SCHLAGETER was born 1 March 1859, New York City, New York. Her birthdate was calculated based on her age when she died¹⁵¹⁶⁹. A search of New York City Birth Records for 1859, found no record of birth (May 2011). In 1860, two year old Carrie was living in New York, Manhattan's 20th Ward with her parents and siblings, Charles six and Emma four¹⁷. On 7 June 1880 she was living at 558 West Thirty Sixth Street, Manhattan, New York with her parents and three siblings. She was working in a silk mill¹⁶. On 25 November 1880, Carrie married Bernhard Heinrich Meyer at St. Luke's Lutheran Church, Manhattan, New York. George M. Reusse, Joseph Mack and Johann Meyer (possibly Bernhard's brother), were witnesses⁹. Carrie was married at the same church as her sisters Anna¹⁸ and Emma¹⁹.

In 1885, Bernhard was listed in the 1885, New York City Directory, as a butcher at 818 First Avenue. His home was listed as 354 East 51st Street. In 1890, Bernhard was working with a SCHLAGETER-*Bernhard Meyer, fat, 1072 Tenth av. Schlageter & Meyer, fat, 1072 Tenth Av*¹⁰¹¹. In 1892, when their daughter Annie died, the family was living at 157 West 68th Street, New York, New York¹². By June 1893, Bernhard may have known he was not well. He transferred property at 137th Street and Trinity Avenue, to Caroline Meyer on 30 June 1893¹³ and he died, 23 July 1893, at home at 953 East 137 Street, Manhattan. The cause of his death was *semente meningitis* and *interstitial nephritis* (meningitis and chronic or acute inflammation of tubules in the kidneys). Bernhard was buried in the Lutheran Cemetery, Middle Village, Queens, New York on 25 July 1893⁵¹⁴. In May 1894, Caroline sold the property on

137 St. New York to Kasper Mueller for \$9000@20. In 1897 the New York City directory listed, *Caroline Meyer widow of Bernhard H., 276 West 67 Street, NYC*. Two years later, we found Carrie living with her father, Mathias at 163 West End Avenue, Manhattan. Mathias died at home in 1899, of *paralysis of the heart*@21.[NOTE: It also may be that the children, Ella, Charlotte and Joseph, were also living with their grandfather before he and Caroline died. Aunt Ella would have known him then. She was eight when he died. Joe was fifteen, Charlotte was twelve and Emma would have been fourteen. Oh, the questions we have now!!!] Carrie's father, Mathias Schlageter, left her a legacy of \$2540.00@22 which at Carrie's death, went to Ella and Charlotte@99. Caroline died 10 March 1900, at home at 163 West End Avenue, Manhattan of *Cancer of the Uterus (operation), Asthenia*@15. She was buried in the Lutheran Cemetery, Middle Village, Queens, New York@14.

4.1 Emma MEYER was born 25 March 1884, New York, New York@23. Emma was baptized on 20 April 1884, at the St. Luke's Lutheran Church, West 42nd Street, New York, in the same church where her parents were married. Witness at her christening was Emma Schlageter Bickelhaupt, sister to Caroline@1. Emma was confirmed on 3 April 1898 at Grace Lutheran Church, New York@24. After her parents died, Emma was raised by her uncle Herman and aunt Hannah (Johanna) Kortlücke Meyer@25. On 19 September 1906, Emma MEYER married George Paul ENGELDRUM, son of Phillip ENGELDRUM (1849-1896) and Elizabeth CLEMENS (1853-1941)@27.

George Paul ENGELDRUM was born on 27 August 1884 in New York City, New York. This was the date we always celebrated. According to his birth certificate, he was born 31 August 1884 at 429 West 45th Street, New York, New York, in the "Hells Kitchen" section of New York (Manhattan), Tenth Avenue between Fortieth and Fiftieth Streets. His mother's maiden name was Flenenz, according to his birth record. He was the seventh child, five were living@35@36. George was baptized at the Church of the Assumption, 425 West 49th Street, New York. His sponsors were George and Catherine Schneider (father's sister). Baptismal certificate gave his birthdate as 27 August 1884@37. An early job as a youth was as a butcher's delivery boy. Fascinating! Peter Engeldrum remembers that his grandfather said he worked as a "delivery boy for a butcher as a kid". Maybe that was the connection to his future wife, Emma Meyer. We find a Schlageter & Meyer in a grocery business together in Manhattan@10. George was a medal winning bicycle racer and entered several bicycle events in New York City, including one and two mile races@38. In 1900, George was living with his widowed mother and four siblings at 658 Eagle Avenue, Bronx, New York@39.

Emma Meyer and George Engeldrum were married in St. Stephen's Church, New York City. Emma's brother, Joseph Meyer and sister, Charlotte Meyer were witnesses@27. After their marriage, they lived at 800/799 Jennings Street, Bronx, New York, and in 1910 Emma's sister, Charlotte, was living with them@28. From 1912 to 1914 they lived on Hunt Avenue, Bronx, New York, where son George was born@46. George Sr., became a Master Plumber and eventually owned his own Business, "George P. Engeldrum Plumbing and Heating", established in 1906. His shop was at 799 Jennings Street, Bronx, New York@121. Later, in the 1950's, he moved the business to Westchester Square, in the Bronx. He sold and installed Silent Glow Oil Burners. From 1914 through 1922, the family lived at 797 and 799 Jennings Street, Bronx New York@29. In 1920, the Engeldrum's were living at 799 Jennings Street, Bronx, New York along with Emma's sister, 28 year old, Ella Meyer@30. About 1922, the family moved to 248 Blair Avenue, Bronx, New York to a home that George Engeldrum built in the Throggs Neck section. [NOTE: History of Wissman Avenue: Francis DeRuyter Wissmann owned an estate in the Throggs Neck Section of the Bronx, New York. When the estate was divided in the 1920's the Avenues were given the names of Civil War Generals- Blair, Prentiss, Meagher and Longstreet, a Confederate

General@41@42]. In 1930, George, Emma and son George were living at 248 Blair Avenue, Bronx, New York@31. Emma died at home, in the Bronx, New York, on 14 April 1931, at the age of 47 years. Cause of her death was *Abdominal Cancer*@32. She was buried in the Lutheran Cemetery, Lot No. 4295, Path 21, Middle Village, Queens, New York on 17 April 1931 @33@34@14@32.

Children: George Peter (1912-1984)

After Emma died, George Paul married Esther Catherine RYDQUIST, daughter of Swam RYDQUIST and Christina OLSON, on 21 December 1931 @113@114. Esther was born on 24 November 1890 at home, 653 Bedford, St. Paul, Ramsey, Minnesota@27. About 1912, Esther entered the Mount Sinai School of Nursing, Manhattan, New York, as a member of the class of 1915 (Mt. Sinai Alumnae News). In 1920, she was living in Manhattan with Mary and Frances Daly and their mother at 106 West 107 Street, New York@116 @117. After graduating from Nursing School, Esther worked as a private duty nurse for "Dr. Jonas" and traveled with him caring for his patients. Her local address was 6 West 107 Street, New York, New York. Her passport revealed her foreign address as Paris, France. It is very likely that she traveled as a private duty Registered Nurse from 1928-1930@118. It was the influence of my "grandmother" Esther, that led me to a career in nursing.

George and Esther were married in St. Francis De Chantel, Bronx, New York. George's son George P. Engeldrum Jr. and a nurse colleague of Esther's, Mary Daly, were witnesses@113@114. In August 1960, George and Esther moved to 1280 West Front Street, Lincroft, New Jersey, to live with his son and family. George Peter Engeldrum, added a garage and two room apartment onto his existing home. Esther was the only "grandmother", we, Engeldrum children knew while we were growing up. Esther Catherine died in the Riverview Hospital, Red Bank, Monmouth, New Jersey, on 7 October 1961, at the age of 70 years@115. Esther was buried on 11 October 1961 in the Calvary Cemetery in Brooklyn, New York@17. George Paul died in Red Bank, Monmouth, New Jersey, on 30 July 1965, at the age of 80 years. He was buried on 3 August 1965 in the Calvary Cemetery, Section 19, Range 4, Plot E, Grave 13, 14, 15, in Brooklyn, New York@45. They had no children.

4.1.1 George Peter ENGELDRUM was born 26 October 1912, at home, 1904 Hunt Avenue, Bronx, New York@46. Sponsors at his baptism were his uncle, Peter Engeldrum and aunt, Charlotte Meyer@47@48. In 1920, he was living at 799 Jennings Street, Bronx, New York with his parents and his Aunt Ella Meyer@30. George was confirmed at the St. Benedict's Church, Bronx, New York, in 1920@47. By 1930, the family was living at 248 Blair Avenue, Bronx, New York in the house built by his father, George Sr.@31. In 1937, George applied for a position in the New York Fire Department. He was a Fireman in the New York City Fire Department, Ladder #48, Seneca Avenue. Bronx, New York, Hunts Point Section, until his retirement in 1957.

In June of 1938, George married Edna Amalia Marie PETERSON, daughter of Anders Walfrid PETERSON (1870-1959) and Ida Amalia ORDELL (1875-1950). He was living at 248 Blair Avenue, Bronx, New York at the time@49. Edna Amalia Marie PETERSON was born on 11 September 1909 in Toms River, Ocean, New Jersey@50. In 1910, Edna was living on Lafayette Avenue, Englewood, Bergen, New Jersey at the Gate House of Phillips Estate where her father was the grounds keeper@53. In 1920 Edna, her parents and four brothers, were living at 29 Sheppard Avenue, Englewood, Bergen, New Jersey @54. After graduating from the Montclair Normal School, Edna was a first grade teacher in Dumont, New Jersey, until daughter Judith was born in 1939@119. By 1930, the Peterson family had moved to 271 Sheppard Avenue, Englewood, Bergen, New Jersey, to a house built by her father Walfrid@59.

George and Edna were married in the Paul's Episcopal Church, Englewood, Bergen, New Jersey on June 25, 1938. His father, George Engeldrum, was best man, and Imogene Cunningham, friend of Edna's, was Maid of Honor@49. After they married, they moved to 3866 Amundson Avenue, Bronx, New York. In 1942, after son Peter was born, the family moved to 3168 Wissman Avenue, Bronx, New York on the corner of Wissman Avenue and Longstreet Avenue. This was around the corner from George's father on Blair Avenue. From 1950 through 1984, Edna was a "scout widow". George was involved with the Boy Scouts of America. In 1957, he was awarded the Order of The Arrow, he received the Silver Beaver Award

in 1968, and Life member in Order of The Arrow, December 2, 1984. He was too sick to attend the medal presentation so the Scouts presented it to him in the hospital⁴⁷. After his retirement from the New York Fire Department, in 1957, George was employed as a civilian photographer at the Naval Base, Bayonne, New Jersey and Fort Monmouth, Eatontown, New Jersey. In 1958, the family moved to 1280 West Front Street, Lincroft, Monmouth, New Jersey. George Engeldrum died 22 December 1984, at the Riverview Hospital, Red Bank, Monmouth, New Jersey. The cause of death was *Lung Cancer*. His body was donated to the Farleigh Dickenson University School of Dentistry¹²⁰. Edna continued to live at 1280 West Front Street, Lincroft, New Jersey until her death. Edna died on January 8, 1998, at her home, 1280 West Front Street, Lincroft, New Jersey of *Metastatic Cancer of Gall Bladder to the liver*. She was 88 years old⁶¹. She was cared for by her children, Judith, Peter, and Paul, and Riverview Medical Center Hospice. Edna donated her body to the University of Medicine and Dentistry, Newark, New Jersey, and cremation was at the Rose Hill Crematory, Linden, New Jersey⁶². It was her wish that her remains be taken to Sweden and buried in her grandfather's cemetery, Glömminge Kyrka Cemetery, Isgärde, Öland, Sweden. In May 2000, her family traveled to Sweden to bury Edna Peterson Engeldrum's remains⁶³⁶⁴

Mrs. Edna Engeldrum, 88, of Lincroft, a retired teacher, died yesterday at home. Memorial services will be held at 1 p.m. tomorrow in the Presbyterian Church at Shrewsbury. Mrs. Engeldrum was a teacher in Dumont before retiring. After that, she worked at Kiddie Kampus in Lincroft. She was a 1928 graduate of Montclair State College. Mrs. Engeldrum was a member of the Presbyterian Church at Shrewsbury, where she was a Sunday School teacher, deacon and a member of the Mission Belles Circle. She was also a member of Dalahäst Lodge 742 Vasa Order of America in Colts Neck. Born in Toms River, she lived in Englewood and The Bronx before moving to Lincroft. Surviving are a daughter, Mrs. Judith E. Eggers, two sons, Peter G. and Paul D., a brother, Harold O. Peterson, and three grandchildren⁶⁵.

4.2 Joseph Richard MEYER SR was born 13 July 1885, in New York City, New York⁶⁶. According to a note we found from Ella Meyer Lindberg, Joseph's sister, Joseph was raised by his aunt Anna Schlageter and uncle George Decker²⁵. Anna Schlageter Decker was his mother's sister. This was verified in the 1900 census, where we found Joseph living on East 61st Street, Manhattan New York with his aunt, Anna Schlageter and uncle, George Decker, and uncle Mathias Schlageter⁶⁷. On 3 August 1918, Joseph married Freda Ethel DITTWALD, daughter of Alexander DITTWALD (1857-) and Emily BECK in Utica, New York ⁷⁵¹²². Freda Ethel Dittwald was born 16 January 1890 in New York⁷⁵⁷⁴. Prior to her marriage, Freda, was living in Gloversville, New York, with her sister, Augusta, and her family⁷⁴. In September 1918, Joseph and Freda were living at 16 Striat Street, Arlington, New York⁶⁸. In 1920, Joseph and Freda and son, Joseph, age ten months, were living on Striat Avenue, Poughkeepsie, New York⁶⁹. By 1930, the family had moved to 80 Strong Street, Bronx, New York⁷⁰. They were on the move again and in July 1933, Joseph and Freda were living at 133 South Street, Bogota, New Jersey⁷¹, and from April 1942 through 1947, we found them at 400 Palisade Avenue, Bogota, New Jersey. Joseph was working in a real estate law office, in New York City⁷²⁷³. Joseph died 4 March 1968 in Cooperstown, Otsego, New York⁶⁶. After Joseph died, in 1972, Freda went to live with her son, Richard, in Maine⁷⁵. Freda died in February 1983, in Presque Isle, Maine according to the Social Security Death Index.

4.2.1 (Joseph) Richard (Dick) MEYER Jr. was born 15 November 1919, in Poughkeepsie, New York⁷⁵⁷⁷¹²². In 1920, he was living with his parents on Striat Avenue, Poughkeepsie, New York ⁶⁹. In 1930, he was living with his parents and brother at 80 South Strong, Bronx, New York⁷⁰. "Dick" wrote that he was very close to his cousin, George Engeldrum. He first learned to ride a bike at

his cousin George's house in Throggs Neck, Bronx, and his first cup of coffee was at the Engeldrum house. He recalled Sunday lunch visits to Throggs Neck and the large stack of boiled ham Aunt Emma had for sandwiches⁷⁶. On 23 April 1943, Richard married Charlotte REIHMANN⁷⁸. They were divorced in May 1946⁷⁷. They had no children⁷⁵. In 1948, Richard moved to Maine⁷⁷, and on 12 January 1950, he married Geneva Eleanor PELLETIER⁷⁸. Geneva was born 27 June 1927, in Sheridan, Maine⁷⁷. While living in Maine, Richard worked for a radio station⁷⁵. He died 2 November 1996 in Presque Isle, Aroostook, Maine according to the Social Security Death Index. Geneva may still be living at 118 Fleetwood St, Presque Isle, Maine 04769 207-769-3041⁷⁹. There is no death information in the Social Security Death Index(2011).

4.2.2 William Howard MEYER was born 24 November 1922, Bronx, New York⁸⁰¹²². In 1930, William was living with his parents and brother at 80 Strong Street, Bronx, New York⁷⁰. In 1967 William married Evelyn LONGFRITZ daughter of Grover LONGFRITZ and Anna EDWARDS¹²². Evelyn was born 23 August 1924, in New York in the town of Gloversville⁸²⁸⁰. She had two children from a previous marriage⁸². William retired from the US Air Force⁷⁵. In 1997, at time of Evelyn's death, William and Evelyn were living at 5 Tupelo Drive, Clifton Park, New York. Evelyn died at home, 1 February 1997, Clifton Park, Saratoga, New York⁸⁰⁸². She was cremated and will be buried in the Saratoga Battlefield National Cemetery, upon the death of William¹²². According to public records William is still living at 5 Tupelo Dr. Clifton Park, New York, 1997-2007 ⁸¹. They had no children. There is no information in the Social Security Death Index on William H. Meyer (2011).

4.3 Charlotte Wilamina MEYER was born 19 October 1888, New York, New York. Her birth date was calculated from her age on her death record⁸³⁸⁴. After the death of their parents, in 1900, we found Charlotte, and her sister, Ella living at the "Children's Fold," at West 155th Street, Manhattan. They were listed as pupils, with her birthdate of October 1889⁸⁴. After leaving the "Children's Fold", we found Charlotte living with her brother-in-law, George P. Engeldrum, and sister Emma at 799 Jennings Street, in the Bronx, New York in 1910.²⁸ Charlotte married her cousin, William Meyer about 1917⁸⁵. William Charles MEYER was the son of Gerhard Frederich MEYER (1849-1902) and Anna Maria (Elizabeth) BORNE (1856-1891). He was born 19 January 1879, New York, New York⁸⁹. In 1902, William married Pauline Katherine Blum in Manhattan, New York⁹³⁹⁴. Pauline died 14 December 1914. They had one son, William. (See Family of Gerhard Frederick Meyer for more information on William).

After their marriage, William and Charlotte were listed as roomers at 107 Aquaduct Avenue, Bronx, New York along with his son, William Jr., age seventeen⁸⁶. In 1930, Charlotte and William were still living in the Bronx, at 799 Jennings Street, the same address as Charlotte's sister Emma Engeldrum⁸⁵. In 1931, in the New York City Directory, Charlotte Meyer was working as a stenographer in a hospital, 341 East 30th Street, New York⁸⁷. In 1935, Mr. and Mrs W. C. Meyer, attended the wedding of William's cousin, Edward Rogers⁸⁸. In July 1938, when they visited the newlyweds, George and Edna Engeldrum, Charlotte's nephew, Charlotte and William were living at 3029 Briggs Avenue, Bronx, New York⁷¹. Edna Peterson Engeldrum recalled referring to William as "Uncle Willie"⁷¹. On William's 1942 WWII draft registration, he indicated that he was living at 3029 Briggs Avenue, Bronx, New York and his wife Charlotte, was the contact person. He worked for Norwich Union Insurance Company⁹⁵. William died 11 October 1943 in the Mt. Sinai, Hospital, Manhattan, New York³⁴. He was buried October 14, 1943 in the Caroline Meyer plot in the Lutheran Cemetery, Middle Village Queens, New York¹⁴. After William died, Charlotte moved to live with her sister, Ella Lindberg at 273 East 164th Street, Bronx, New York. Charlotte died 26 January 1946, at the House of Calvary, Bronx, New York. She was buried in the Caroline Meyer plot in the Lutheran Cemetery, Middle Village Queens, New York on 29 January 1946⁷³³⁴¹⁴⁸³. They had no children.

4.4 Annie MEYER was born 9 June 1890, New York, New York⁹⁶. She died 19 January 1892, at home, at 157 West 68th Street, Manhattan, New York¹².

4.5 Ella Georgiana MEYER was born 11 October 1891, New York, New York²³⁸⁴. She was baptized at the Grace Lutheran Church on 5 June 1892. Her aunt, Mrs. Ella Meyer, wife of Uncle John Meyer, was her sponsor. Their son, Hiram was also baptized the same day, and Ella's mother Carrie was

his sponsor 2397. In 1899, Ella was crossed off list of next of kin in her grandfather's will22 and in 1900, we found Ella and sister Charlotte living at the "Children's Fold" at 454 West 155th Street, near St. Nicholas Avenue, Manhattan, New York. They were listed as pupils and her birthdate was given as October 1892 84. After Ella left the "Children's Fold" she went to live with her uncle, John D. Meyer, and his wife, Ella, her sponsor at her baptism, and their family at 653 West. 82 Street, New York. She was listed as his 19 year old niece. She was working as bookkeeper at a plumbing supply company, "Engeldrum's Plumbing and Heating Supply, for her brother-in-law, in the 1910 census98. From February 1913-May 1919, there was correspondence to Ella Meyer from her "Uncle Mat" written on G. BICKELHAUPT SKYLIGHT WORKS, INC, 255 West 47th Street, New York, stationary. He wrote of paying Ella from her inheritance. He also wrote of requests for Ella to sign drafts to him as a loan for his business and to inform Charlotte that she would have to wait for her money as well. In 1916, the business moved to 722 Eleventh Avenue, New York99. In 1920, Ella was living with her sister, Emma Meyer Engeldrum, and family at 799 Jennings Street, Bronx, New York30. On 27 March 1921, Ella married Henry Albert LINDBERG, son of Henry A. LINDBERG (1863-1952) and Ingrid A. JOHNSON (1863-), in the Bronx, New York. Henry was born 21 August 1890, in Landskrona, Sweden100. He was naturalized when he was six years old in the Court of Common Pleas, Fairfield, Connecticut. The family was living in Greenwich, Connecticut, at the time106. In 1910, the family moved to the Bronx, New York108. Henry enlisted in the US Army, 8 December 1917. He served in France and was discharged 10 May 1919107. After his discharge, he lived with his parents on Elton Avenue, Bronx, New York 109.

On 27 March 1921, Ella Georgina Meyer. married Henry Albert Lindberg in the Emmanuel Evangelical Lutheran Church, Bronx, New York. Witnesses were Marion Carlson and Henry's brother, George Lindberg34 100101. In 1930, Ella and Henry, were living in an apartment at 1084 Home Street, Bronx, New York100, and moved to 1339 Bristow Street, Bronx, New York71. From 1946 through 1952, Ella and Henry were living at 273 East 164th Street, Bronx, New York83102. They later moved to Richfield Springs, New York. Henry died 19 June 1969 at the Veterans Administration Hospital, Albany, New York110105111. He was buried in the Long Island National Cemetery, Farmingdale, Long Island, New York on 24 June 1969105. Ella died in a Nursing Home in Cobblekill, New York 15 July 1976103104. She was also buried in the Long Island National Cemetery, Farmingdale, Long Island, New York, 19 July 1976105. They had no children. Ella was the favorite Aunt of George Peter Engeldrum and from my observation she treated him like her son.

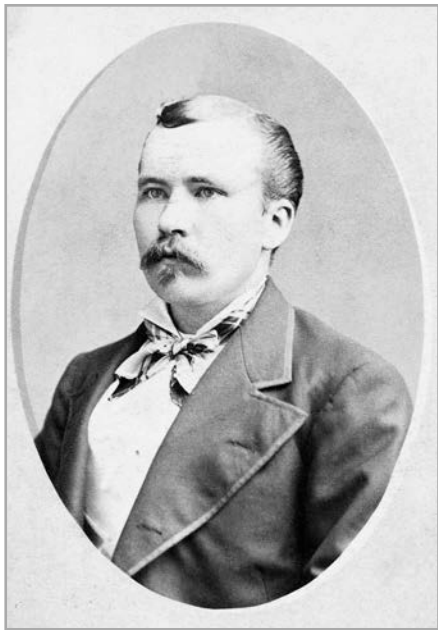

When Johanna was baptized in 1854, her godparents were Friederich Heinrich Staferla and her cousin, Johanna Werdelmann¹⁴ ¹⁵¹⁶. She emigrated along with her parents, grandmother, and siblings in April 1862¹⁷. She too, was listed as MEIER on the passenger manifest¹⁸. We found Johanna living in Jersey City, New Jersey with her parents and two siblings in 1870¹⁹. According to the census, she was naturalized in 1875¹⁰. Johanna married Adolph Heimberg 22 July 1877 in the St. John's German Lutheran Church in Manhattan, New York. At the time of her marriage to Adolph, she was living with her brother, William at 16 Sullivan Street, New York, City⁴⁶.

Adolph, son of Ernst HEIMBERG (1823-1915) and Elise ENGELAGE (1823-1907) was born on 14 June 1863 in Hanover, Prussia¹. He immigrated on 29 October 1868 arriving in Baltimore, Maryland, listing his destination, as New York². Adolph worked as a salesman and grocer while living at 244 West 30th Street, in Manhattan⁵⁶. On 7 October 1875, he was naturalized and his sponsor was grocer, Bernhard H. Meyer, Johanna's brother and soon to be brother-in-law!³.

In 1877, Adolph married Johanna Meyer, Bernhard's sister. Adolph, and his brother, August, were living at 187 Orchard Street, Manhattan at time of the marriage⁴. Johanna's brother, Wilhelm and August Heimberg, Adolph's brother, of 187 Orchard Street, New York, were witnesses⁴⁶. In 1880, we found Johanna and Adolph living in New York, with their son Ernst⁷. In 1900, the family had moved to 168 South Second, Brooklyn, Kings, New York. Johanna, Adolf, children Ernest, Frederick, Johanna, and Elise were living with her mother, Johanna Kartlücke Meyer⁸. In 1910, the family was living at 135 Moffett Street, Brooklyn, New York⁹. By 1920, the family had moved to 220 Moffett Street in Brooklyn, New York and son Ernst was listed as a widower¹⁰. Johanna (Anna) Frederike Heimberg died at home, 220 Moffett Street, Brooklyn, New York, on 14 May 1923. She was 68 years old, and the cause of death was *carcinoma of small intestines*. Johanna was buried on 15 May 1923 in the Evergreen Cemetery, Lot Manus #Nazareth #1885, 1629 Bushwick Ave, Brooklyn, New York²⁰¹². Adolph moved to New Jersey sometime after Johanna died in 1923. We found him living with his daughters Johanna Heimberg Lewis, her husband Leroy Lewis, and Elise Heimberg in Montvale, New Jersey in 1930¹¹. Adolph Georg Louis Heimberg died in Montvale, Bergen, New Jersey, on 14 February 1938, at the age of 74 years. He was buried on 17 February 1938 in the Evergreen Cemetery, in the Heimberg family plot, 1629 Bushwick Ave, Brooklyn, New York¹²¹³.

5.1. Ernest William HEIMBERG was born on 4 December 1878 in New York, New York⁷²¹. In 1880, he was living in New York, with his parents⁷, and in 1900 he was living at 168 South Second, Brooklyn, Kings, New York with his parents, siblings, Frederick, Johanna, and Ellise, and his grandmother, Johanna Kartlücke Meyer⁸. On 10 February 1909, Ernest married Augusta Watts CLAYTON, daughter of Alexander Theodore CLAYTON and Mary Jane, in the Calvary Church in Brooklyn, New York. Witnesses were Alex. T. Clayton and Mary Jane Clayton, Augusta's parents²². Augusta Watts Clayton was born on 14 April 1879 in New York, New York²⁹³⁰. At the time of his marriage, Ernest was living at 422 Hamburg Avenue, Brooklyn, New York, with his grandmother Johanna Kartlücke Meyer²²²³. His grandmother, Johanna Meyer, died few months later²³. Augusta was living at 871 Gates Avenue, Brooklyn, New York²². In 1910, Ernest was living with his wife, Augusta, on Marion Street, Brooklyn²⁴. In 1917, when Ernest registered for the draft, he was living in Brooklyn, New York²⁵²⁷. In 1920, we found Ernest living at 220 Moffett Street in Brooklyn, New York with his parents and sister Elise. He was listed as a widower ¹⁰. In 1920, we also found Augusta W. Heimberg, age 41, living in Brooklyn, with her parents, Alexander and Mary Clayton and her son, Clayton, in Brooklyn, New York²⁶. It is possible that Augusta went to live with her parents after a separation or divorce³¹. Ernest William died at 220 Moffett Street, Brooklyn, Kings, New York, on 8 November 1922, at the age of 43 years. He was buried on 11 November 1922 in the Heimberg family plot in the Evergreen Cemetery, 1629 Bushwick Avenue, Brooklyn, New York²⁸¹². It is interesting to note that Ernest's death certificate stated that he was married. In 1930, we found Augusta living in Brooklyn with her mother, Mary Clayton and son Clayton³². Augusta worked as a clerk for Life Insurance Company. Augusta Watts Heimberg died in Lyndenhurst, Suffolk, New York, on 27 May 1954, at the age of 75 years. Augusta was buried on 1 June 1954 in the Greenwood Cemetery, Brooklyn, Kings, New York³⁰³¹.

5.2. August Frederic HEIMBERG was born 16 June 1880 in Manhattan, New York³³³⁴. In 1900, he was living at 168 South Second, Brooklyn, Kings, New York with his parents, siblings Ernest, Johanna, and Ellise, and his grandmother, Johanna Meyer. August was employed as a clerk⁸. He never married. He was living with his parents and sister Elise and died before the 1910 census was taken. August died, on 10 March 1910, at home, 135 Moffett Street, Brooklyn, Kings, New York, at the age of 29. He died from *Tuberculosis of the Lungs*, and he was buried on 20 March 1910, in the family plot in The Evergreen Cemetery, 1629 Bushwick Ave, Brooklyn, New York³⁴¹².

5.3 Johanna E. HEIMBERG was born 18 May 1882 in Brooklyn, Kings, New York¹¹. In 1900 she was living at 168 South Second, Brooklyn, Kings, New York with her parents, siblings, Ernest, Frederick, and Ellise, and her grandmother, Johanna Meyer⁸. On 8 December 1909, Johanna E. married Leroy LEWIS, son of William LEWIS (~1854-) and Ida WILLIAMSON (~1858-), in Kings, New York¹¹³⁵.

Leroy LEWIS, was born 27 April 1875 in Rockford, Illinois¹³¹¹. In 1880, he was living in Holton, Wisconsin, with his parents³⁷. In 1885, he enlisted in the army (1886-1889). He worked as a bookkeeper and was discharged 25 July 1899 in Havana, Cuba³⁸. Later in July 1899, he re-en listed in Havana, Cuba for another three years in the Infantry. In 1900, he was assigned to Columbia Barracks, Cuba, Military and Naval Forces, as a Sergeant, in the Field Staff and Band, 8th Infantry. His residence was listed as 287 9th Street, Oshkosh, Wisconsin³⁹³¹. Leroy Lewis was discharged 25 July 1902, in Mariveles, Philippines, as a Sargent³⁸. He served in Spanish-American War and World War I³¹ and was honorably discharged 25 July 1914³⁸. While still serving in the US Army, he married Johanna Heimberg on 9 December 1909 ¹¹³⁵.

In 1920, Johanna (Anna) and her husband Leroy, were living in Brooklyn, New York. The census record indicated Leroy was a Major in United States Army. In 1930, we found Leroy and Johanna living in Montvale, New Jersey with Johanna's unmarried sister, Elise and her father, Adolph. Johanna Heimberg Lewis died in Montvale, New Jersey, on 8 October 1937. She was buried on 11 October 1937 in the family plot in the Evergreen Cemetery, Brooklyn, New York. According to Clayton "Ted" Heimberg (great nephew), Leroy married Johanna's sister Elise, after Johanna's death. Upon his retirement from the service, Leroy had obtained the rank of Lt. Colonel in the U.S Army. He was living at 66 North Kinderkamack Road, Montvale, New Jersey when he died on 24 June 1959. He was 84 years old. He was buried on 27 June 1959 in the Evergreen Cemetery, Brooklyn, New York. Also buried in the plot was Johanna E. Lewis, age 55, birth year 1882. They had no children.

5.5 Elisabeth (Ellise) Wilhelmina HEIMBERG was born on 8 June 1886 in 421 East Sixth Street, Manhattan, New York. In 1900, she was living at 168 South Second, Brooklyn, Kings, New York with her parents, siblings, Ernest, Frederick, and Johanna, and grandmother, Johanna Meyer. In 1910, she was living at 135 Moffett Street in Brooklyn, New York, with her parents. Elise was employed as a stenographer in a law office and as a bookkeeper for lumber company. In 1920, she was living at 220 Moffett Street in Brooklyn, New York, with her parents, and widowed brother Ernst. After her mother died, the family moved to Montvale, New Jersey, where we found Ellise living with her sister, Johanna and her husband, Leroy Lewis, and their father, Adolph. After her sister, Johanna died, in 1937, Elise married her brother-in-law, Leroy Lewis. In 1959, she was living at 66 Kinderkamack Road, Montvale, New Jersey and was the responsible party for her husband, Leroy Lewis, at time of his death. Elisabeth (Ellise) H. Heimberg Lewis died in the Woodcrest Center, New Milford, New Jersey, on 5 September 1973, at the age of 87 years. She was buried on 9 September 1973 in the family plot in the Evergreen Cemetery, Brooklyn, New York. The responsible person at time of her death was Clayton Heimberg, 66 Kinderkamack Road, Montvale, New Jersey. This was probably her nephew, son of her brother Ernest, as he was living at same address as Elisabeth in 1959. They had no children.

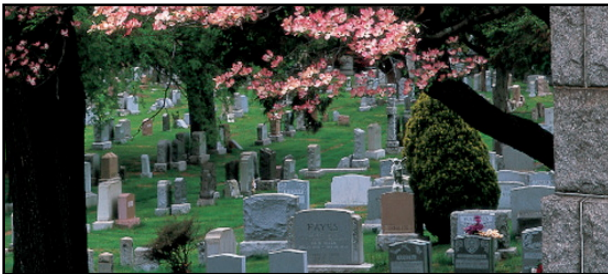

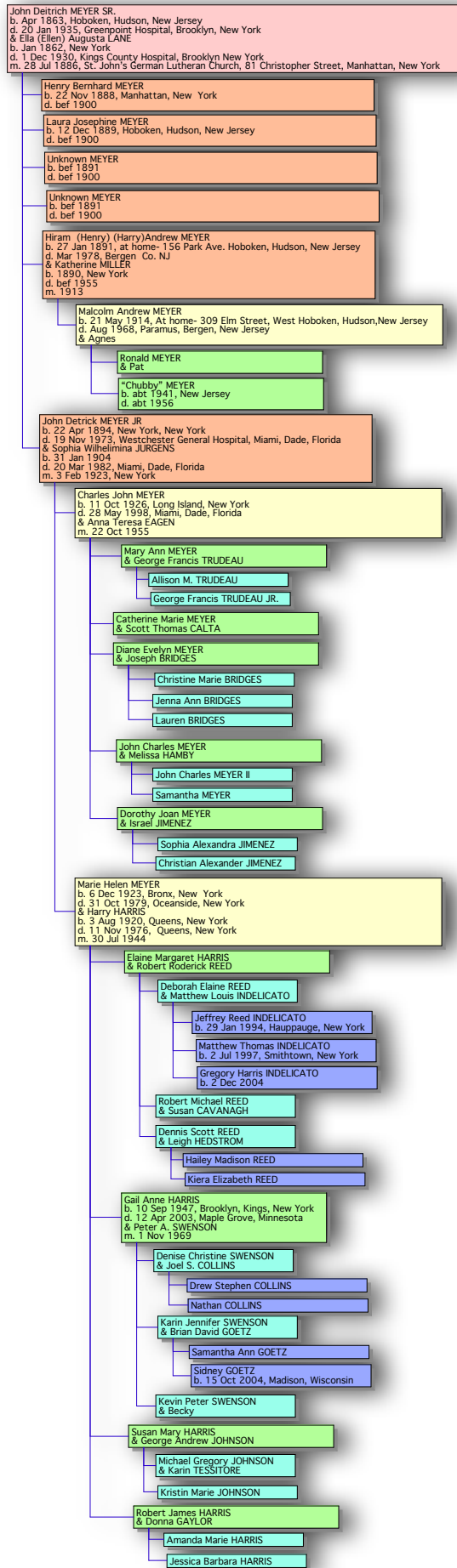

By 1880, Diederick was living with his eldest brother, William, and family, and his mother, Johanna Kartlücke Meyer, at 16 Sullivan Street, Manhattan, New York City. He was working as a machinist apprentice. On 28 July 1886, when John Deitrich was 23, he married Ella (Ellen) Augusta LANE.

Ella (Ellen) Augusta LANE, the daughter of Hiram A. LANE (1830-) and Ella Mc DONNEL (1836-<1880), was born in January 1862 in New York. In 1870, at age eight, Ella was living with her parents and six siblings in Brooklyn, New York. Ten years later, her father, Hiram A. Lane, a widower, was living with his daughters, Mary E, age twenty-five, Ellen age eighteen, daughter "Jane" age sixteen, (this could have been miss-transcribed. It could be James) and daughter Laura J. age fourteen.

John and Ella were married on 28 July 1886, in the St. John's German Lutheran Church, Manhattan, New York. Laura Lane, Ella's sister, and Minnie Meyer, Dietrick's sister were witnesses. Minnie and John were living together at 106 Christopher Street, Manhattan and Ella was living at 45 South Washington Square, Manhattan. Church records indicated that John Dietrick was born in New York City. In 1891, we found John and Ella living at 156 Park Avenue, Hoboken, New Jersey where son, Hiram, was born. Ella Lane Meyer was a witness for her niece, Ella Meyer's christening, in June 1892. Son, Hiram, was also christened on the same day and niece, Ella's mother, Carolyn Schlageter Meyer, was the witness for Hiram. Hiram's birth certificate indicated that he was the fourth child in this marriage. The family moved back to Manhattan, New York by 1900, and they were found at 554 West 54 Street, Manhattan, New York with their two sons. The 1900 census stated Ella had six children, and only two were still living. In 1910, John D. Meyer, his wife Ella, two sons, and his orphaned niece, Ella Meyer, were living at 653 West 82nd Street, Manhattan, New York. John worked in a soda bottling company, and was listed as a manufacturer of mineral water. John, Ella and their son John, moved to the Bronx, New York by 1920, and were living at 971 Summit Avenue, Bronx, New York. John was working as a watchman at a tire company. The family moved to 1018 Summit Avenue, Bronx, New York by 1930, where John worked as a delivery man for a tailor shop. Some time after the census was taken in April 1930, Ella and John moved to live with their son, John and his family at 6527 79th Street, Middle Village, Queens, New York. This was Ella's home until her death. Ella (Ellen) Augusta Lane Meyer, died in the Kings County Hospital, Brooklyn, New York, on 1 December 1930, at the age of 68 years. She was buried on 3 December 1930 in the Lutheran All Faiths Cemetery, Middle Village, Queens, New York. When Ella died, in December 1930, John was the informant for Ella's death certificate. John Deitrich died in the Greenpoint Hospital, Brooklyn, New York, on 20 January 1935, at the age of 71 years. He was buried in the same plot as Ella, on 24 January 1935 in the Lutheran All Faiths Cemetery, Public Lot 30 Map 3A Row 26 Grave 35, Middle Village, Queens, New York.

6.5 Hiram (Henry) (Harry)Andrew was born on 27 January 1891 at home, 156 Park Avenue, Hoboken, Hudson, New Jersey⁴⁸. At his baptism in June 1892, his aunt Carrie Meyer, wife of father's brother Bernhard, was the witness⁴. In 1900, he was living at 554 West 54 Street, Manhattan, New York with his parents and brother John³. In 1910, his orphaned cousin, Ella Meyer, was living with his family at 653 West 82nd Street and Hiram was working as a stock boy in a department store¹. In 1913, when Hiram (Henry, Harry) Andrew was twenty-one, he married Katherine MILLER, daughter of Unknown MILLER and Annie E. UNKNOWN (1862-)²¹. Katherine was born in 1890 in New York²⁸²²²¹. After their marriage, Henry and Katherine lived at 309 Elm Street, West Hoboken, New Jersey on the second floor²². His cousin, Minnie Meyer Rogers, and her husband Charles Rogers, lived on the first floor²³. When Hiram registered for the draft in June 1917, he was living at 208-20th Street, Hoboken, New Jersey with his wife and son Malcolm. Henry was employed as a bookkeeper for an elevator supply company²⁴²⁵. In 1930, Henry, Katherine, their son, Malcolm, age fifteen, and mother-in-law, Annie E. Miller, were living at 904 Park Avenue, North Bergen, New Jersey. Harry was employed as an office manager in a newspaper office²¹. In 1935, Mr. and Mrs. Harry Meyer attended the wedding of his cousin, Edward Rogers to Martha Freideman²⁶. When Harry registered for the draft in 1942, he and Katherine were living at 157 A 61st Street, West New York, Hoboken, New Jersey, and Harry was employed at King Features Syndicate in New York City²⁷. I have not been able to find the death record for either Hiram (Harry, Henry) or his wife Katherine. As noted, Hiram used several variations of his name making tracing difficult. Katherine was known as Aunt Kitty²³. Henry died before the marriage of his nephew, Charles Meyer to Anna Eagen in 1955 ²⁸.

6.6. John Dietrick MEYER, JR., was born on 22 April 1894 in New York, New York¹. In 1900, he was living at 554 West 54th Street, Manhattan, New York with his parents and brother Hiram³. In 1910, John was living with his parents, brother, and orphaned cousin, Ella Meyer at 653 West 82nd Street, Manhattan, New York. He was working as stock boy in a plumbing shop, most likely Engeldrum's Plumbing and Heating business, his cousin Emma's husband¹. In 1917, he registered for the draft²⁹. In 1920, he was living with his parents at 971 Summit Avenue, Bronx, New York, and was employed as an electrician on the subways⁹.

On 3 February 1923, John Dietrick married Sophia Wilhelmina JURGENS, daughter of Frederick JURGENS (1870-) and Marie UNKNOWN (1876-), in New York³⁰. Sophia was born on 31 January 1904³²³⁶. From 1910 through 1920, she was living with her parents and four siblings in Dry Harbor, Road, Queens, New York³⁴³⁵. Sophia was nineteen years old when she married John Meyer in 1923.

Witnesses were her brother Henry E. Jurgens, and Mary Martha Jurgens, possibly his wife¹²³⁰. In 1930 we found John, Sophia, daughter, Mary and son Charles, living at 65-27 79th Street, Queens, New York. John was employed as a ticket agent¹². John's father, John Sr., was living with him at the time of his death in 1935¹⁴. The family moved to 9109 88th Road, Woodhaven, Queens, New York, and in 1942, John was employed by the New York City Transit System, Hudson Street, New York³¹ John Dietrick Meyer died in the Westchester General Hospital, Miami, Dade, Florida, on 19 November 1973, at the age of 79 years. He was buried on 21 November 1973 in the Miami Memorial Park, Miami, Dade, Florida³². A one-line obituary in The Miami Herald was found for John D. Meyer in 1973 and is as follows: *Tuesday, November 20, 1973 page 7-B. Meyer, John D., 79, of 6750 SW Eighth St. Services 11 a.m. Wednesday, Lanier-Josberger-Lithgow Funeral Home*³³. The informant for his death certificate was his daughter-in-law, Mrs, Charles Meyer, 9344 SW 37th Street, Miami Florida³². It was this information that led me to this branch of the family tree. At time of her husbands death in 1973, Sophie was living in Florida ³². Sophia Wilhelmina died in Miami, Dade, Florida, on 20 March 1982, she was 78 years old. She was buried on 23 March 1982 in the Miami Memorial Park, Miami, Dade, Florida³⁶. The Obituary in The Miami Herald March 22, 1982:

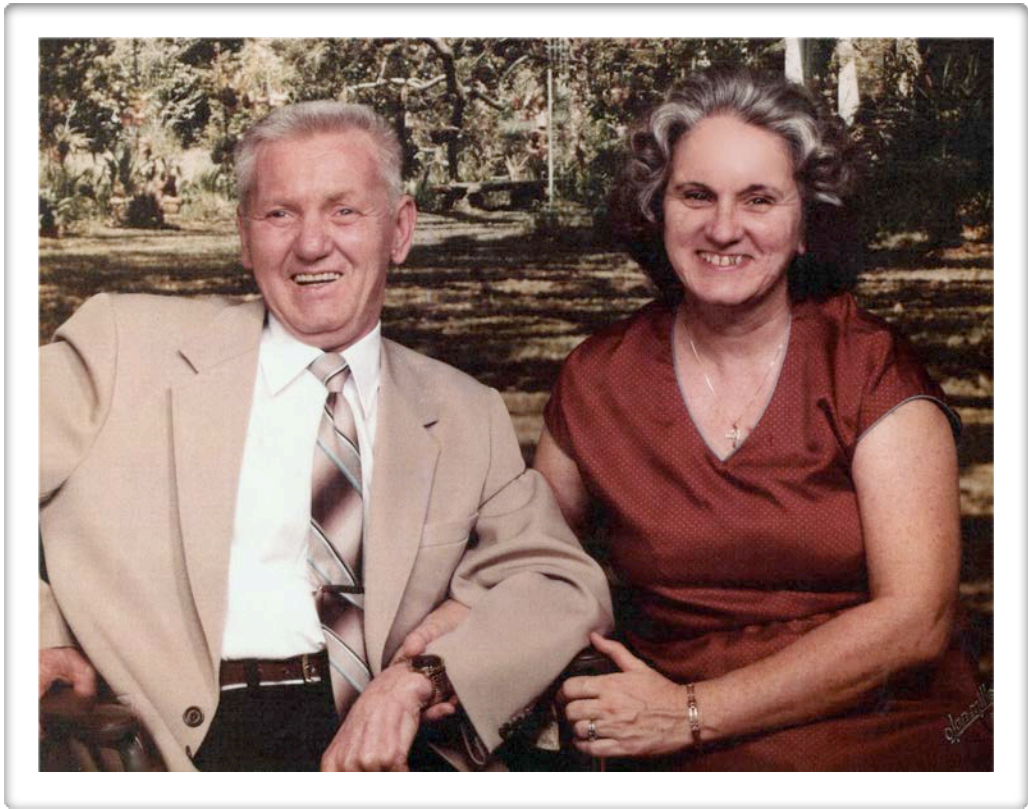

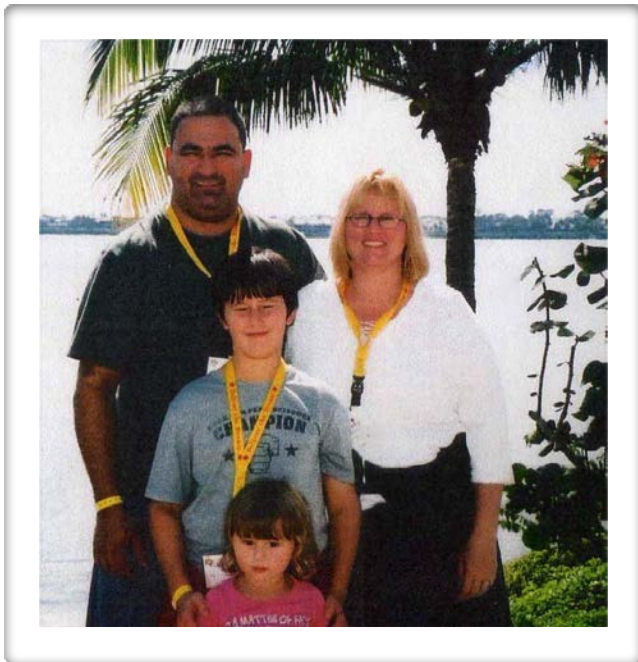

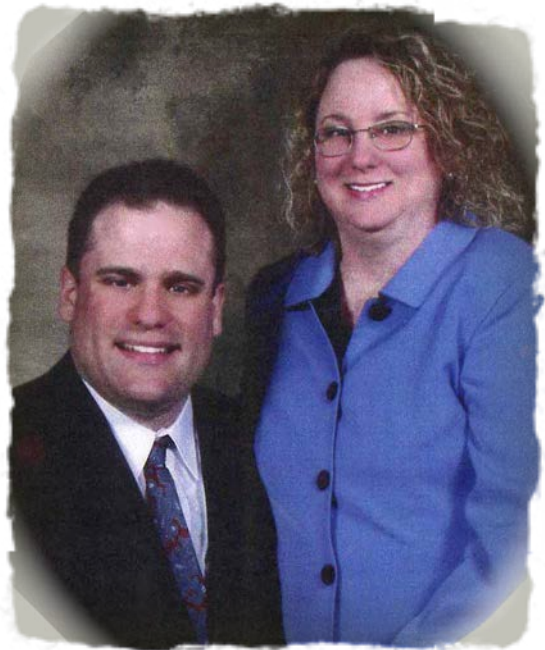


Charles Meyer and Anna Eagen Meyer. Florida c 1984.

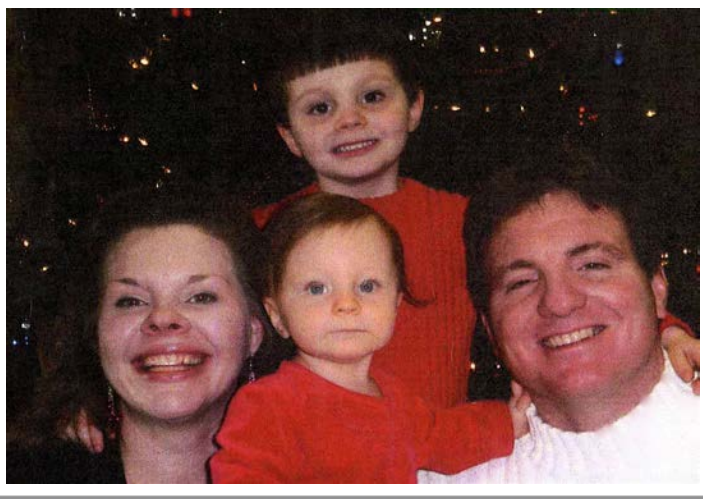

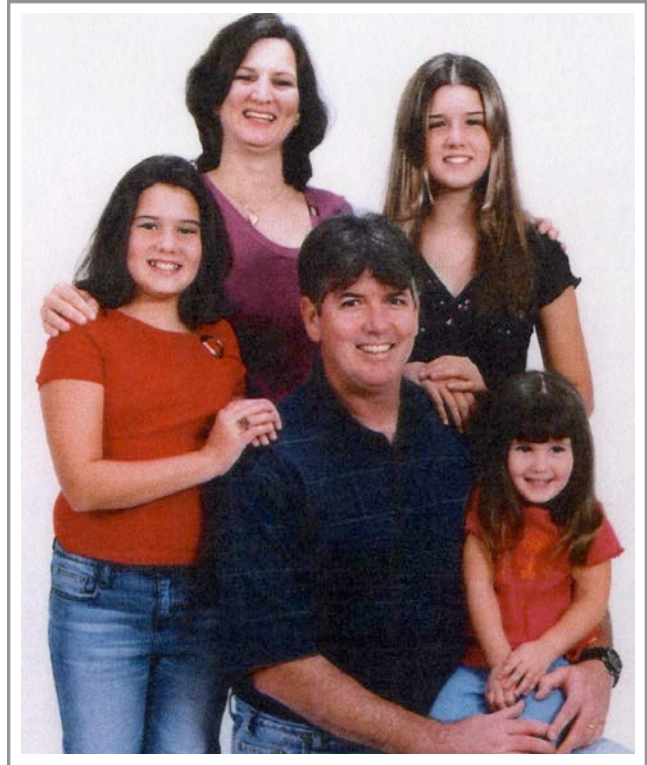

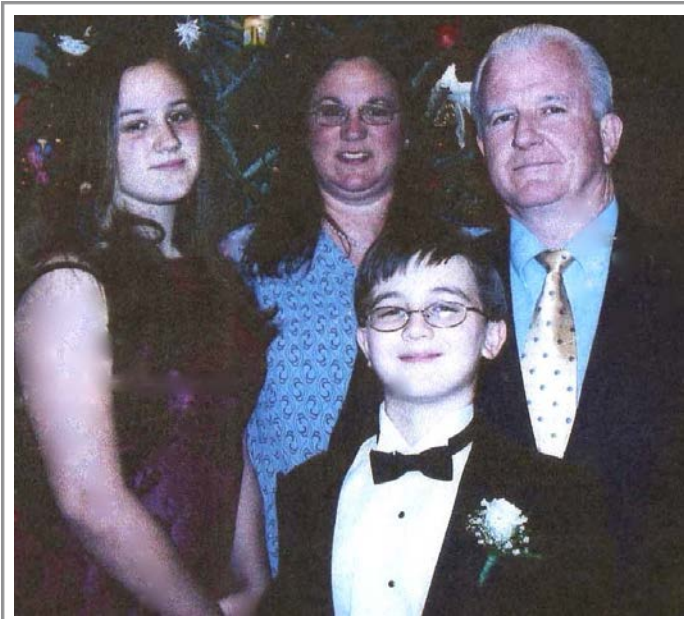

Wilhelmine was born at the home of her parents, Johan and Johanna Meyer, 79 Orchard Street, Manhattan, New York⁷⁸. In 1870, Minnie was living with her parents, brother, Dietrick and sister, Anna, in Jersey City, New Jersey. She was six years old⁹. In 1880, it appeared that the Meyer family was separated, possibly because of the death of Johan Meyer. Minnie was living in the apartment at 46 Jackson Street, New York City, with her uncle Gerhard Frederick Meyer and his family. She was fifteen years old and listed as his daughter¹⁰. Minnie Meyer was a witness at her brother, John's (Dietrick) wedding in 1886. They were living together at 106 Christopher Street, Manhattan, New York, at the time¹¹. That was the same address given by Minnie on her marriage certificate in 1888. Minnie married Henry Köhler on 9 October 1888 at the St. John's German Lutheran Church on Christopher Street, Manhattan, New York³.

Henry was the son of Georg KOHLER (KÖHLER)(KOEHLER). (1832-) and Frederike Emma KAISER. (1827-). Henry, born in 1864, was living with his parents on Elizabeth Street between Grand and Hestor Streets, New York City in 1870¹². Minnie and Henry were both twenty-five years old when they married. Witnesses were her brother William Meyer and Minnie Kaiser, probably a relative of Henry's mother, an aunt or cousin, since his mother was Frederike Kaiser. Henry was living at 187 Hestor Street at the time and Minnie was living with her brother John at 106 Christopher Street⁴³. We do not know when Minnie died, except that her husband was listed as widower, and married for the second time, 29 November 1891². A search of the Lutheran All Faiths Cemetery, Queens, New York, yields no burial record of Wilhelmine C.F. Meyer Köhler. They had no children.

Henry worked as a Brass worker and chandelier fitter¹. In 1891, after Wilhelmine's death, Henry remarried. He married the sister of his brother-in-law, Gerhard Frederick Meyer's first wife, Anna Borne. At the time, he was living in Brooklyn, New York. Witnesses were Wm. C. Borne, George Borne (probably Mamie's father and brother) and Mary Kunkle. Mamie was twenty years old and she was living at 527 Ninth Avenue, New York².

From 1910 through 1930, Henry and Mamie lived in a rented apartment at 297 Grove Street, Brooklyn, New York, with their two children³⁴. In 1930, Henry and Mamie lived in a rented apartment at 32 Granite Street, Brooklyn, New York. He was employed as a fitter in a ship yard⁵

There was a Henry Koehler listed in New York City death index, May 22, 1932, age 69 in Manhattan, certificate # 12474. This is a possibility. Search of the All Faiths Cemetery, Queens, New York, yields no record of Henry Kohler. [NOTE: The name Köhler means charcoal burner.⁶]

She was employed as a gilder of signs³. Mary (Minnie) B. married Roy MILLER¹³, LeRoy H. Miller, June 15, 1915¹⁵. They lived in Brooklyn, New York and Hempstead, New York¹⁶¹⁷. According to the Social Security Death Index, Leroy Miller died in October 1965.

From 1910 through 1920, Barbara was living with her parents, Henry and Mamie Borne Koehler, at 297 Grove Street, Brooklyn, New York. She worked as a bookkeeper in a Law office⁴³. Barbara married Ted (Unknown). They had no children ¹⁴. Barbara married Theodore R. Schultz, June 6, 1925¹⁸.

Chapter Six- Family Legacy

One of the observations I made while doing this research, was that the Meyers appeared to be a close knit family. Family members served as witnesses for one another for naturalizations, marriages, and they shared housing in the tenements of New York, under very crowded conditions. It was striking to me, as I reviewed all the material for this book, that Heinrich Wilhelm (William) Meyer, the first born, along with Herman Wilhelm Meyer, assumed the paternal role, serving as witnesses for their brothers' naturalizations, and as witnesses at the weddings of their siblings. Heinrich Wilhelm Meyer took in his widowed mother, Johanna Kortlücke Meyer and younger brother, John Dietrick Meyer, to live with his family after the death of his father, Johan Dietrick Meyer. It is unfortunate that after much research by myself and Carol Rogers Baum, we were unable to find him and his family after 1891, when he was a witness for brother Gerhard Frederick Meyer's second marriage. The rest of the family also cared for nieces and a nephew after brother, Bernhard Heinrich Meyer and his wife Caroline Schlageter Meyer died. Their children were orphaned at early ages, between nine and fourteen. They were cared for by brothers of Bernhard Heinrich Meyer and a sister of Caroline Schlageter Meyer. Family members were employed by other family members. George P. Engeldrum, owner of the Plumbing and Heating Supply Company, provided jobs for his sister-in-law, Ella Meyer, and two cousins of his wife, Emma Meyer, William F. Meyer and John D. Meyer. He was also very generous in providing a home to Emma's two sisters, Charlotte Meyer c.1910 and Ella Meyer c.1920. Family members also married in-laws after the death of their spouses (see below). This was not uncommon, particularly if there were young children. The men needed support in caring for the children. Family members remained close geographically as well, providing for their social circle and interaction. We know they all married in the St. John's German Lutheran Church in Manhattan or the St. Luke Lutheran Church in Manhattan, and most of them are buried in either the Lutheran Cemetery in Middle Village, Queens, New York or the Evergreen Cemetery in Brooklyn, New York.

Interlocking Families

Among immigrant families, it was not at all uncommon for second marriages among brothers-in-law, sisters-in-law and cousins. Although we might look askance at such practice today, it kept families close-knit, practically reduced courting time and effort, and provided "foster homes" for children of deceased family members. The Meyer family was no exception to these practices. Remarriages of Johan Meyer and Johanna Kartlücke Meyer's children, and the foster homes provided by the extended family, resulted in many interlocking relationships.

Sibling 1 Heinrich Wilhelm (William) Meyer married Elisabeth Schreck. Her sister may be Geraldine Schreck, Gerhard Frederick Meyer's second wife (sibling 3).

Sibling 2 Herman Wilhelm Meyer married Johanna Kartlücke, who was his cousin. Their daughter, Johanna (Amelia) Meyer, married Joseph Lockhart. Their daughter, Anna Meyer, married Joseph Lockhart after her sister Johanna's death. Herman and Johanna Kartlücke Meyer took in Emma Meyer, daughter of Herman's brother, Bernhard Meyer, after Emma's parents died.

Sibling 3(a) Gerhard Frederick Meyer and Anna Borne's son, William Meyer, married his cousin, Charlotte Meyer, daughter of Gerhard's brother, Bernhard Heinrich Meyer.

(b) Gerhard Frederick Meyer married Geraldine Schreck, after his wife Anna Borne died. It is possible that Geraldine was sister to Elisabeth Schreck, wife of Heinrich Wilhelm Meyer (sibling #1). Both Carol Rogers Baum and I have tried to find documentation to validate this connection, without success

Sibling 4 Bernhard Heinrich Meyer and Caroline Schlageter's daughter, Charlotte Meyer, married her cousin, William Meyer, son of Gerhard Frederick Meyer.

Sibling 5 Johanna Meyer and Adolph Heimberg's daughter, Johanna Heimberg, married Leroy Lewis. After Johanna Heimberg Lewis died, Leroy Lewis married his late wife's sister, Elisabeth (Elise) Heimberg.

Sibling 6 John Meyer married Ella Lane. John Meyer and Ella Lane Meyer took in Ella Meyer, daughter of John's brother, Bernhard Meyer, after Ella's parents died. Ella Lane Meyer was also the sponsor for Ella Meyer at her baptism.

Sibling 7. Wilhelmine Meyer married Henry Köhler. Henry Köhler married Mary, (Mamie) Borne, sister of Anna Borne, wife of Gerhard, (sibling #3) after Wilhelmine (Minnie) Meyer died.

Family Memories

The following memories include snippets of correspondence/ information that was passed along to me from family members, in e-mails, and telephone conversations, while researching our Meyer family. It illustrates some of the many interactions and relationships between many of the Meyer family members.

Judith Engeldrum Eggers

As I received and reviewed the memories submitted by Meyer family members, it was very clear to me that there were very few reference to my Engledrum branch of the Meyer family, except for memories recorded on tape in 1992 by Edith Rogers Bierl

Edith recalled that her mother, Minnie Meyer Rogers' father, (Gerhard Frederick Meyer) had a "brother", who was in fact, Bernhard Heinrich Meyer, my great grandfather. The brother had three girls, Emma, Charlotte, whom they referred to as Lottie, and Ella. The three girls were raised in an orphanage until they were 21. She had recollections of George Engeldrum, my grandfather, the plumber, living in Throggs Neck, Bronx, New York.

After Emma's marriage to George Engeldrum, Charlotte Meyer left the orphanage and went to work in Engeldrum's plumbing company, in the office. Edith Rogers and her parents, Minnie Meyer and Charles Rogers, were living in Port Washington, New York, at the time. Edith recalls Emma Meyer and her husband, George Engeldrum, and their son, my father, George Peter Engeldrum, visiting for picnics in Port Washington, New York. Included in the picnics was Ella Meyer Lindberg and her husband, name unknown (Henry), and Charlotte (Lottie) Meyer and their cousin William Meyer (Will). It was very clear to the family that Charlotte and Will were in love. After Will's first wife, Pauline, died, Charlotte and Will married even though they were cousins. From then on, Charlotte was known as "Charlotte", and no longer Lottie. [Editor's note: Edith did not recall the names of Gerhard Frederick Meyer's brother, son of George Paul Engeldrum and Emma Engeldrum or the husband of Ella Meyer Lindberg, Henry Albert Lindberg.]

My grandmother, Emma Meyer Engeldrum, died when my father was a teenager. Ella Meyer Lindberg, Emma's sister, my father's aunt, was the only Meyer we knew and grew to love. I remember going to her apartment in the Bronx and walking down the alleyway to get to her ground floor apartment in the back of the building. She and her husband, uncle Henry Lindberg, were the superintendents of the apartment building. During our Sunday afternoon visits, she always took me over to the delicatessen where she let me choose what the deli menu was to be for the evening. Fun! As Ella aged, my parents, myself, and my son, Robert Eggers, would visit with her in Cooperstown, New York, and then in the nursing home in Cobleskill, New York. We usually visited Aunt Ella in October, over Columbus Day weekend. The changing color of the fall foliage often provided a spectacular ride.

Neither Ella Meyer Lindberg nor her sister, Charlotte Meyer Meyer, had any children. Their brother Joseph Richard Meyer Sr., had two boys, William Meyer and Joseph Richard (Dick) Meyer Jr.. We did visit with them, but not very often. Neither of the two sons, my father's cousins, had any children. Cousin, William Meyer, attended Edna Peterson Engeldrum's 85th Birthday Party in New Jersey in 1994. My mother, Edna Peterson Engeldrum recalled William C. Meyer, Charlotte Meyer's husband, being referred to as "Uncle Willy".

It is also puzzling that my father had a picture of a 25th anniversary celebration for Mr. and Mrs. Henry T. Meyer, December 22, 1934. My mom and dad, Edna Peterson and George Engeldrum, are in the picture,

along with my father's aunt Ella Meyer and uncle Henry Lindberg, and my grandfather, George Paul Engeldrum. My family had no clue who all the other people were, or had any information about the Henry T. Meyers. There must be about 100 people in the picture! With the help of Carol Rogers Baum and Janet Junge Merkel, we have since put names with many of the faces.

Peter George Engeldrum

Peter Engeldrum, recalls his father, George Engeldrum, mentioning that he had relatives in Leonardo, New Jersey, but it was never pursued. Many of the family members lived or still live in New Jersey. This I have discovered as Carol Rogers Baum and I uncovered more leaves. In the late 1950's, Peter Engeldrum attended Middletown High School in Middletown, New Jersey along with classmate, and third cousin, Fred Williamson.

Edith Rogers Bierl-More memories from her 1992 tape.

After William C. Meyer remarried, his son, William F. Meyer, went to live with his aunt, Johanna Meyer Schroeder, in Union City, New Jersey.

Edith Rogers was born on Elm Street, Union Hill, New Jersey in 1913. The Rogers family, Minnie Meyer, and Charles Rogers, lived on the first floor and above them, lived Minnie's cousin, Harry (Hiram, Meyer) and his wife "Aunt Kitty"(Katherine Miller Meyer) and their son, Malcolm Andrew Meyer.

Edith Johanna Rogers Bierl, recalled that Anna Maria (Elizabeth) Borne Meyer, her grandmother, was only known to her as Grandma Meyer. She never knew her first name. She recalled that Anna Borne Meyer gave birth to a baby born with a lump on its neck (Anna had Tuberculosis). Her sister, Mamie Borne, who later married Henry Köhler, took care of the baby until it died (death date unknown).

After Anna Borne Meyer died, Edith recalled that her grandfather, Gerhard Frederick Meyer, married Geraldine Schreck. Edith recalled her mother, Minnie Meyer Rogers, telling her stories about her step mother, Geraldine Schreck Meyer. It appeared that Geraldine was the stereotypical definition of a stepmother. One incident she recalled her mother telling her, was when her mother, Minnie Meyer Rogers, had gone to visit her sister, Lisa (Elizabeth Meyer) and was five minutes late getting home. She had to ring the door bell a couple of times to get into the house. As a result of having to do this, Geraldine kicked her mother (Minnie Meyer Rogers) through the railroad rooms (a long line of rooms) of the house. Minnie told her brothers, (Frederick and William Meyer), and they asked their sister Hannah (Johanna Schroeder) to come to take Minnie to live with her and her husband Herman Schroeder. Minnie was sixteen years of age when she went to live with her sister, Hannah (Johanna Schroeder).

Carol Rogers Baum

Aunt Edith Rogers Bierl was a big woman with broad shoulders. She lived on Elm Street, behind the post office on Thirty Second Street, Union Hill, New Jersey. Aunt Edith (Rogers Bierl) lived downstairs and Aunt Kitty (Katherine Miller Meyer) and her husband, Hiram (Henry) Meyer lived upstairs during those years.

Aunt Edith Rogers Bierl, did quite well for a girl and woman who had very little sight. She was a woman who always laughed at things. You could tell that she enjoyed life and it was a happy time for her in spite of her visual limitations. She played the piano and sang, but couldn't see enough to read music. Before making the tape in 1992, she had suffered a stroke.

My grandmother, Minnie Meyer Rogers stayed with her sister, "Hannah" Johanna Meyer Schroeder, and then stayed with their sister, Elizabeth "Lizzie" Meyer, to help care for her until she died. Lizzie had been married but had no children. After her sister, "Lizzie" died, Minnie went back to live with her sister, "Hannah" Meyer Schroeder, until she met Charles Rogers at a dance. Minnie Meyer and Charles Rogers dated on Wednesdays and weekends for six months, and then married.

I always remembered my grandmother, Minnie Meyer Rogers with her beautiful white short hair. She used to get permanents to give her curls. Her son, my father, Edward Rogers, always wanted his wife, my

mother, Martha Freideman Rogers, to have curls in her hair too. I always wanted the white hair, that was passed down to my father, and I am getting my wish.

I remember that my grandmother, Minnie Meyer Rogers, crochet dollies and then sold them to earn money. She made many, and my cousins and I inherited many of them, along with the fancy hankies she crocheted edges on to make them special. She also did edgings on pillow cases too, and crocheted table cloths.

I remember that my grandmother, Minnie Meyer Rogers, used to delight my brother, Ed Rogers, and myself at Christmastime with a gift of \$1.00 each.

Our parents, Ed Rogers and Martha Freideman Rogers, would take us to Union City, New Jersey to spend a day with my grandparents, Minnie Meyer Rogers and Charles Rogers. We would eat a nice meal with them, and then we made the rounds to visit my father's other siblings at their homes. The siblings also brought my grandparents, Minnie Meyer Rogers and Charles Rogers, to my home in Pompton Plains, New Jersey, to celebrate the holidays, including Christmas and New Years. In fact, my father brought my grandparents, Rogers, to live with us in Pompton Plains, New Jersey with the hopeful intentions to have them move to our town and get away from the city. They lasted one week. They missed their life in Union City.

I remember that my Grandmother Rogers became ill with breast cancer and she was being cared for by her daughter, Edith Rogers Bierl, in Edith and "Charlie" Bierl's home. My mother, Martha Freideman Rogers, took me to visit Grandma Minnie Rogers and to help do some things for her. This was a very sad time. After her funeral, the family gathered and attended a church service in the Lutheran Church where they had a very strict German speaking pastor. He would stop speaking when someone sneezed, and permitted no loud talking or noise, plus he would never let the children attend the service. Funny, how things made an impression on someone.

Grandma Rogers and her sister, Hannah Meyer Schroeder, were active in the Eastern Star, and Grandma Rogers was a member of the Ladies' Guild at her church. My cousin, Ethel Dorothy Bierl later joined the Rainbow Girls, a group of young girls connected with the Eastern Star.

When we visited Dad's (Ed Rogers), siblings, uncle Charles Bierl used to block off a space on the side of his street for us to park our car. Homes didn't have garages, so everyone parked on the side of the streets. Uncle Charlie (Bierl), who we called Charles Bierl, used to spend time during the holidays at our house or his, reading our future with cards. My cousin, Ethel Dorothy Bierl, and I, used to pester him to do this so that we could learn what the man would be like that we were to marry, and the date of our marriage. I always remembered that I was to marry on August 24th, but that didn't happen. I did get a dark haired man though!

I met Aunt Mamie Borne Köhler, when I was 5 years old. She came to care for me for about a week, in Pompton Plains, New Jersey when my mother, Martha Freideman Rogers, gave birth to my brother, Edward, in 1942. Dad brought her home and we called her "Aunt Mamie". She always wore her hair pulled back into a bun. I know that she had a daughter or two at the time. She was gentle with me, and taught me how to eat oatmeal, which I never forgot.

I remember going to Leonardo, New Jersey to visit aunt Annie Sponar Meyer and uncle Fred Meyer and went to their little store, which I thought was in their home. I remember Mildred Meyer's, second husband, Raymond Courtney's wood shop and items he made, He made a small wooden pig cutting board and my mother purchased it. We used it a lot when we lived at 11 Della Avenue, Pompton Plains, New Jersey. It is now owned by my daughter in-law, Annette Yungeberg Baum, in Topeka, Kansas. (*Sandra Guttormsen English*)..... and yes, he was a blind man... incredibly talented with his hands... used three electric saws, drills and sanders to make furniture; caned chairs and sold them through the state agency ... he worked at a tool and dye factory until they closed the factory down.

Carol Rogers Baum and Sandra Guttormsen English

Carol-"Do you remember the story about uncle, Henny Meyer, buying a new Edsel car and driving it out of the showroom and smashing it up, then went back and bought another one?" *Sandy*-"Not only do I remember uncle, Henry Theodore Meyer Sr., buying the Edsel, I rode in it. He came down to visit grandma and pa, Anna Sponar Meyer and Frederick Meyer, who lived in the Leonardo section of Middletown, New Jersey. They called him "Henny" but the kids always called him Henry. I was "his little buddy". We all went for a ride in the new car, birds egg blue, and it was just as big as a boat. He was so proud of that car". *Carol*:"Boy, you were a lucky one to ride in that new Edsel. Funny how some of us have certain nicknames for a person and it differs for others."

Sandra Guttormsen English

When I graduated from high school, I was given aunt Ada's Kopeke Meyer's watch which I wore with a great amount of pride. It was on a pin and was just exquisite.

Aunt Anna Meyer and uncle Fred Williamson lived over the grocery store which they owned and operated after Grandpa Frederick Meyer got older, and couldn't handle it by himself anymore. The Meyer home was part of the original building that housed the grocery store, a building and loan (credit union type) organization, later a barber shop and their little apartment/house. Grandpa, Fred Meyer, built a grand swing set for the kids in the back yard, and they had a screened in back porch where we would all sit and watch the lightening during a thunderstorm.

Mildred Meyer Guttormsen, my mother, didn't discuss family much, although grandma, Anna Sponar Meyer, spoke of her family years ago...but now I just don't remember. I remember Grandma Sponar sitting in rocking chair at my grandparents home and speaking German to my grandmother, but not much more.

Judith Lockhart Walsh

My grandfather, Morell Stewart Lockhart, called Johanna Kartluke Meyer "Oma", as she lived with him for most of his early life and he was very close to her. She also taught him to speak German.

Joanne Williamson Monday

I know that my mom, Anna Meyer Williamson, always said that my grandmother, Anna Sponar Maile, did not come here through Ellis Island. She made, I think five trips to the United States before she settled here. She was married to William Maile and soon became a widow. They had one child, my uncle "Bill" McKinley Maile Meyer. My mom, Anna Meyer Williamson, told me long ago that the first time my grandfather, Frederick Meyer, proposed, my grandmother, Anna Sponar Maile, said no. At that point Grandpa was somewhat unsuccessful. He came back the second time to propose and she finally said yes. When they married, Grandma Meyer was a widow. Sometimes these family stories get passed down and "tweaked" along the way, but that is how I remember it.

Fred Meyer did quite a bit of work to help found the "Blind Men's Club". My mom, Anna Meyer Williamson, has always gone by the name "Anne", Anne Charlotte Meyer Williamson Murphy. Her name was Anna, but there were a lot of "Anna's" in the family so she started to go by Anne. She still works two days a week at the "Blind Men's Club Thrift Shop" in Leonardo, New Jersey. She helped to found the organization and has volunteered there, I think, for something like twenty years. Anne Meyer Williamson often tells the story of her Dad, Frederick Meyer, being the Grand Marshal at the parade which celebrated the grand opening of the club, and of and him wearing a top hat, while sitting in the back of an open car, and riding all around town. Fred Meyer also helped start the fire company and received permission to dredge the water to create the Leonardo Boat Harbor, which is now a New Jersey State Harbor.

Fred Meyer built a small block of buildings, where he operated the "White House Grocery Store". It was located at 41 Center Avenue, Leonardo, Middletown New Jersey, on the corner of Center and Brevent. The store had three aisles, and was really the first grocery store in the area. My mom, Anna Meyer Williamson, lived above the store. When she married my father, Fred Williamson, the two of them took over the business and we, Fred, Ray, myself and then Gerry, all grew up living above the store.

Another interesting family note is the strong family ties to Wagner College in Staten Island, New York. Family graduates include Fred Williamson, Scott Williamson, Raymond Guttormsen, Joanna Williamson Monday, Geraldine Williamson Mahoney, Robert Guttormsen, Nicole and Laura Mahoney, Janet Junge Merkel and August "Gus" Merkel. The family gathers each year, to celebrate the birthday of Anna Meyer Williamson Murphy by attending a Wagner football game with a big tailgate party. Anna is the big football fan.

Janet Junge Merkel

The Herman Schroeder, who was in Andersonville, during the Civil War, was my great grandfather. I have his discharge papers. Neither he nor his wife, Hillary, "Hillie" as they called her, could read and write. His discharge papers were signed with an X, as was her claim to his military pension. He re-enlisted after his first discharge and served another "stint" for a two hundred dollar bounty.

My grandparents, Herman and Johanna Meyer Schroeder, owned and operated a candy and ice cream store in West New York or Union City, called Schroeders. They made their own ice cream and chocolate candy, including Bunnies and other Easter candy at Easter time. I never saw it myself, I have just heard stories about it.

My Grandfather, Herman Adolf Schroeder, was the custodian of the Masonic Temple in Union City, New Jersey and Grandmother, Johanna Meyer Schroeder, helped with catering parties, especially making 50-100 pounds of her wonderful German Potato Salad. She also ran the coat check for parties and weddings. In her later years, she lived in the Eastern Star Home, Masonic Home in Burlington, New Jersey. My Dad, John Joseph Junge Sr., also spent his last few months in the Masonic Home in Burlington, New Jersey. My brother, John Junge Jr., was a member of Demolay and the Masons in Rutherford, New Jersey. *Editor's Note: There appears to be a strong connection to the Masons and Eastern Star through out the Meyer family. This is, perhaps, a Chapter for the Second Edition.*

My mother, Hilda Schroeder Junge, had always been very close to Anna Meyer Williamson. I used to spend my summers, babysitting Anne's children, Fred, Robert, Joanna and Geraldine. Guess that makes me pretty old.

The Meyer store front looked like the "White House Store". The store was at 31 Center Avenue in Leonardo, New Jersey, There was a strip of four to five stores, and Fred Meyer owned all of them. On the corner, was the "White House Store", a general store, then there was a barber and perhaps Tom's next door, not connected to Tom Murphy. He did not enter the picture until long after Anne Williamson's husband, Fred, died. Anne Meyer Williamson later married Thomas Murphy. Aunt "Annie" Sponar Meyer and uncle Fred Meyer lived up over the store, and raised their family, Bill, Anne and Mildred there. When Fred and Anne Sponar Meyer retired, their daughter, Anne Meyer, and her husband, Fred Williamson, bought the store and they lived upstairs. "Annie" and Fred Meyer lived in one of the stores at the end of the strip, which was converted to a home. They lived there with Grandma Sponar, until her death. Charlotte Morris Meyer, wife of Bill Maile Meyers, and the mother of Wilma Meyer, also lived there until her death in 1996.

Ethel Bierl Avello

My grandfather, Charles Rogers, didn't drive so my father, Charles Bierl, would drive and we would take my grandmother, Minnie Meyer Rogers to visit her brother, Fred Meyer in Leonardo, New Jersey. Uncle Fred and aunt Anna Sponar Meyer lived in a one story building that had a store front. The store was converted to house. When you entered the house, you walked into the living room that was set up like a "row" house. Fred Meyer owned a grocery store on the same street, on the corner as I recall. I lost contact with this branch of the family as I grew up.

My family lived near my grandmother, Minnie Rogers and her sister, my aunt, Johanna Meyer Schroeder in Union City, New Jersey. I have fond memories of walking to my grandmothers' home. It was so easy to walk from my grandmother, Minnie Rogers house to Aunt Johanna's home. There were many children in her apartment building who were my age. I loved to stay overnight, and in the morning Grandma

would have toast for me with my breakfast. The toaster was the kind that sat on the stove and you put the bread on the four sides. [NOTE: This is the reliable camping toaster]. After breakfast, I would then walk to school with the other children. This overnight stay gave my parents a rest.

I remember helping my grandmother, Minnie Meyer Rogers, clean her house. Grandma (Minnie Rogers) gave me twenty-five cents to help her with cleaning the apartment and change the linen on the beds. She lived in an apartment that had “railroad rooms”, the rooms were all off a long hallway. There were no fitted sheets back then so she used two flat sheets. Each time I changed the linen, we rotated the sheets, the top sheet would go on the bottom and the clean sheet would be the top sheet. I also washed and set her hair in pin curls which gave her those nice curls. Her sister, Johanna, wasn’t so sure that she wanted curls, but she let me set her hair on rare occasions.

When my grandmother was diagnosed with breast cancer, she came to live with my mother. I was about twenty years old then. We had her hospital bed and all her equipment, in our living room. Our apartment was small, so my grandfather had to stay in his own apartment. The day Grandma died, my sister, Ruth, met me at the bus stop and told me when I got off the bus. A sad day.

I remember the family picnics to Anona Park in Upper Saddle River, New Jersey. We rented the picnic table for the summer and aunt Mamie Borne Köhler would come with us. She had back problems and would lie down on the picnic bench. I do not remember where Aunt Mamie lived, or how she got to our home to join us. I do remember that she had a daughter, Barbara, who married a man named Ted. They had no children and I remember that they traveled a lot.

Lauren Meyer Roach

My father, Henry Theodore Meyer Jr., had done quite extensive research into the Meyer family. I knew he had relatives in New Jersey but we never met them.

Descendants

All of these family stories leaves me wondering why my Engeldrum family did not have more interaction with our Meyer branch—close and yet so far. Unfortunately, there is no Meyer from my branch of the family alive who can answer that question.

A genealogists work is never done. It seems the more we research, the more question arise. You can see from family recollections, that stories may change as they pass from generation to generation, and many family member have the same pleasant and positive recollections of the same activity. This family history is by no means complete. We have the Meyer family picture from the Anniversary Celebration of Henry Theodor Meyer Sr. and Ada Kopeke Meyer in 1934. Do you know anyone in the picture whom we have not identified (figure 17)?

All the descendants of Johan Meyer and Johanna Kortlüke, I have located as of the date of this publication, are listed in the Appendix. Birth years of living people have been deleted. If anyone is interested in a list of birth dates, you can contact me at jeenterprises@me.com.

I hope this book will help to continue the friendships and contact made through the discovery of more branches. It has been an exciting journey, picking up the leaves of our family tree.

There are blank pages at the end of this book for you to add any other information; birth dates, marriages, deaths, family notes of activities that occur after date of this publication.
