

John Rathbone, Jr., inherited his fathers distinguishing qualities, and became widely known as a successful merchant and financier. He was a member of the New York Legislature for one term; was a devoted adherent of De Witt Clinton, and took great interest in the inauguration of the canal movement in New York and Ohio. In connection with Eleazer Lord of New York, he took the entire amount of the first Ohio Canal Loan in 1825, of \$400,000, and subsequently made a loan in connection with John Jacob Astor to the same State. He was also much interested in banking, and he and his brother-in-law Samuel B. Ruggles,* Ex-Canal Commissioners, etc., were very active in getting a charter and establishing the Bank of Commerce, and were among the first directors elected. John
